The antennas at my station are in pretty good shape and seem to play pretty well. I do want to get one more tri-band beam installed on tower #2 before CQP. The slope my QTH is on is so steep that a 30 foot difference in antenna height can make the difference between hearing and working a station or not hearing/working the station. That means multiple antennas at different levels on the towers. Sometimes you hear a station best on the higher antenna and sometimes the station will come in better on the lower antenna. W6SR has also suggested a 40 meter wire antenna that will give me some gain and supplement the other 40 meter antennas on the property.

NCCC Membership Information

If you wish to join NCCC, you must fill out an <u>application for membership</u>, which will be read and voted upon at the next monthly meeting. (<u>PDF application form</u>)

To join, you must reside within club territory which is defined as the maximum of:

- Northern California, anything north of the Tehachapi's up to the Oregon border, and
- A part of north-western Nevada (anything within our ARRL 175-mile radius circle centered at 10 miles North of Auburn on Highway 49).

It is always my hope that we will get a good rain storm just prior to CQP. Besides reducing the fire danger, it means that insulators will be cleaned off, air conditioners will be turned off, agricultural well pumps may be shut off, etc. In short, the electrical noise magically goes away. Should we not get a good drenching, my new Flex 6700, and its terrific ability to mitigate noise, should greatly help the noise problems that can plague a station like mine which looks down on a valley below that also probably includes lots of grow lights.

Speaking of CQP, have you registered your county yet? So far, I count 25 registered counties on the map. We need more and we will have all 58 counties active. Be sure to register sooner rather than later, so the rovers and contest dxpeditions can see what counties to focus on. Thanks to K6MM and N6TV for keeping the county plan updated daily.

As far as the serious contests go, following CQP is CQWW SSB, on October 29th. While not a focus contest, the CQWW and ARRL DX contests can really help your standing in the NCCC Club Competition.

Awards for the Club Competition will be KB awards, as we have done in the past. Plaques and certificates will be awarded for achieving certain point levels. This is a really good way for the DX'ers in our club to be awarded for their contesting efforts as well as those who enjoy the domestic contests. I'm really looking forward to next year's award banquet so we can recognize all of our point generators including the DX contesters.

Yesterday, it was my pleasure to, again, attend N6XI's annual "Sierra Chapter" BBQ. Rick and Ann, as usual, were gracious hosts. We had a good crowd which included several XLY's. Besides the great burgers, dogs, deserts, and brews, there was also good conversation. CQP, antennas, radios, projects, club ideas, etc. This is really one of the premier, yet unofficial, events that happens every year in our club. Let's hope Rick and Ann continue the tradition. If you haven't yet attended, be sure to consider the drive to the high country next year. You won't be disappointed!

Recording Contest Audio Bob Wolbert, K6XX September 2016 Part II—K3 Radio Configuration

Summary: Part II isn't necessary! New firmware automatically enables this functionality. But here's the rest of the story.

A year ago, I pushed the Elecraft firmware team to provide a better way of recording both sides of contest QSOs so that the K3 could easily meet the CQWW mandate. Receive-side recording was already available via the LINE OUT jack on the K3 and K3S radio's rear panel, but transmit monitor audio was susceptible to misadjustment from the front panel controls. Elecraft's DSP programmer quickly provided a command that enabled fixed-level transmit monitoring, but the user-interface programmer faced problems introducing a menu item for setting this level. The default transmit level was initialized on every power-cycles, and this level was zero. Not very useful.

A DSP programming command was provided. When a special sequence "!4Dnn" is sent to the K3, the transmit monitor level on LINE OUT is fixed. The variable nn represents the output level from 00 (off) to hexadecimal "FF" (maximum). This amplitude was independent of the front panel MON control, meaning that a recorder connected to LINE OUT receives proper levels for quality recording. Unfortunately, this command must be sent every time the radio was turned ON if recording was desired.

Since I log with TR4W, this merely represented a minor annoyance: TR4W provides over 60 function keys, any one of which could send a serial command to the radio. There now was one more thing to remember when setting up for a contest (and any time the radio was turned back ON, of course). But others didn't have it so easy. I leaned on our in-house logging program experts, N6TV for WinTest and K6MM & N6ML for N1MM Logger, to determine some easy way to send the command from their favorite logging programs. Bob quickly came back with a WinTest LUA script performing the chore. But John and Iain were stuck: N1MM Logger has few available function keys that should be used for messages, not squandered for rarely-used functions. I thank Bob, John, and Iain for their efforts.

The most reasonable way for N1MM Logger users to enable this command was via a separate terminal program or the Elecraft K3 Utility. The !4Dnn command would be sent before N1MM Logger itself was started, then the terminal program or K3 Utility must be closed to relinquish the serial port. Functional, but very annoying. Determining a better solution for all operators caused the long delay since Part I was published.

Finally there is good news for K3/K3S operators wishing to record their contest audio. The latest K3 firmware, version 5.51, provides an adequate default transmit monitor level that meets our needs without sending any serial commands to the radio. Simply load the firmware and your rig is ready to go—the !4Dnn command still works, but it is now unnecessary.

This new firmware has been used in contests and it does the job. Recordings are clean and of proper level. The CQWW recording requirement is met or exceeded with the independent recorder system described in Part I (see the March 2016 JUG), allowing unattended continuous operations for 48 hours. Since PC sound cards are not used, station hardware need not change when operating different modes.





TUBE OF THE MONTH

VT-158

Early high power RADARs during WWII were relatively low frequency. Ring oscillators were made using several specially designed triodes and would work at about 200 MHz. This was very high frequency for the early 1940s. These units were very large and not very portable. The need for more portable RADAR units for the Army had the research department at Fort Monmouth, NJ dedicated to the problem. Major Zahl developed the idea of building a single tube that would combine the power of multiple tubes in the same envelope. This was nothing new except for the size and the incorporation of tuned lines as part of the unit. Prototypes were made and tested and eventually the new tubes designated the VT-158 were produced by Eimac, Machlett and H&K.

The early low frequency RADAR units were easily jammed by the enemy. There was a race on by both sides to get higher power at higher frequency that the other side couldn't jam. New equipment was quickly obsolete. The VT-158 operated at 600 MHz so was a big jump in frequency. By the time it was fielded in the AN/TPS-3 RADAR, new equipment was already making it obsolete. This unit had a pulsed output of 240 KW and was triggered by a rotary spark gap. The tube was mounted in a wooded box so the operator was getting cooked as well as shot at.
