THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS (AND IS ALSO LEARNING BEG, ROLL OVER AND PLAY DEAD). The following flatulent fanfaronade comes your way courtesy of W6RGG:

By the time you read this, the CW SS will a thing of the past. Those of you who made a score commitment at the Oct. meeting have hopefully beaten your own goals, and those who weren't there will have a chance to do so for the phone SS (Nov. 16-17). We have thrown down the gauntlet to WWDXC and WVARC for this year's SS, so you still have time to get in on one mode and add your score to the club total.

My thanks to W60WQ and all who assisted him for a fine job at the Pacific Division Convention and W06PDC. I don't know how many new members we'll gain because of the operation, but I'm sure the exposure was of benefit to the club.

As NCCC continues to grow, the need for a permanent meeting-place and regular meeting night is becoming more evident. Based on the geographic distribution of our membership, the most central area would seem to be in southern Alameda County. Inasmuch as new Red Cross rules preclude the consistent availability of their facilities in Oakland, I have moved the November meeting to Hayward (as noted elsewhere in this issue).

The Hayward QTH is available to us on a tinuing no-charge basis, and I have reserved for us for the third Friday of the first six months of 1975. There is ample free parking, a conveniently-located beer-&-pizza place and a nearby cocktail lounge.

It has been suggested that Monday night is a better night for club meetings as there would

be no conflict with contest dates and the Monday following a contest is a good time to collect scores and exchange tall tales. This same Hayward location is available to us on the 2nd or 4th Monday of each month. The Monday Night Quarterbacks among us may take issue with this. Do I hear any suggestions?

WR6ADM, the club repeater, is holding forth on 449.2 MHz input (your transmit) and 444.2 output (your receive). This machine was generously donated by WB6OOL with the provision that we use it or lose it. Recent check-ins have been K6EBB, W6HQN/6, WA6LHN, W6OWQ and W6RGG. W6OAT has a rig and says he will be on soon, as does W6BIP. W6OWQ has rigs available for about \$25. Several members have donated much of their time to get the machine on the air, and Pete gave it to us to use, so let's get some more of you on 450 and see how it works.

Another option is the newly-inaugurated Tuesday night NCCC net: 3838 kHz at 8 PM (10-cal). For those who can't or won't get on 450, this may do the trick. It would seem to lack the privacy of a repeater, however, as 75 has a million ears.

One clarification is in order re the NCDXC "full contest participation" policy alluded to in this column last month. Said policy is that all of their members are encouraged to participate in as many contests as they wish -- not that the NCDXC was going to make a big effort in all future contests. (Ed. Note: That was a result of an editorial misinterpretation and was not RGG's fault. He is perfectly capable of making his own mistakes without extra help.)



THE MAILMAN COMETH and bringeth a nice letter from a recent NCCC recruit, K6KWN:

Greetings to NCCC from a new member. We are glad to be aboard and hope we may prove of some service to the group in our small way. We are located at Lake Almanor, Plumas County, in the high Sierra at 4500' level. We retired and moved here from the L.A. area, five years ago.

We were first licensed in the early 20's as 6EAU. Moved to Washington in the mid-40's and returned to California in the mid-50's, when we were issued the present call.

Equipment here consists of a homebrew CW rig, Swan 500CX, 4L triband beam and an all-band dipole up 80' in the tall trees.

Sorry we were only able to work the CA contest for a short period of time, but did give SV to 62 contacts and picked up 32 sections plus Argentina, Honduras and Japan. We just finished the CD phone contest but have not compiled the results yet. Not very imressive as the bands went dead Sunday. Sure hope condx will be better during CD CW. We look forward to the SS and CQ WW tests, too.

In closing, may I offer the following tidbit. I have entered an awful lot of contests in my 40 years of operating and the only thing I ever seem to win is a sore bottom, red eyes and a bad taste in my mouth from smoking too much. However, if I succeeded in giving the other fellow the one section he needed for a 75 multiplier then I feel it has all been worth while.

Welcome correspondence was also received from W4KFC and W1FBY. However, we'd like o see a little more postal input from NCCC .embers!

SEDIMENT. Reminder: if you utilize the spotting net during a contest, that puts you in the <u>multioperator</u> category and you must so report your entry. However, bear in mind

that entering as multiop does not hurt the club aggregate score. . . One of the benefits available to ARRL-affiliated clubs (and we are, y'know) is a special League membership offer. If you renew your ARRL membership through the NCCC, our Club treasury gets to keep \$1 of the \$9 annual rate (effective January 1, 1975). renew through the Club and help our slender treasury at the same time. WA6NLQ will do the honors for you. . . The Contest Advisory Committee wants to hear from people like us as to what kind of changes we'd like to see in contest administration and related matters. The W6 rep is W6PAA. Bend Ken's ear if you have any gripes or ideas. . . In the 1973 SS, #1 club Murphy's Marauders totalled 7,886,611 points with an even hundred entries. (Keep in mind that an entry refers to each log for each mode; it doesn't mean that a hundred members submitted logs.) If each of the 71 NCCC members now living within Club territory were to score approximately 56,000 points per mode, we would exceed that winning total of last year. An impossible dream? Maybe for this year, but not for all time.

RUBIN REVEALS that WO6PDC, the Pacific Division Convention station manned by NCCC'ers, chalked up 916 QSO's (pre-dupe) in the CQ WW DX Test (phone). Among those who may or may not have operated were WA6AHF, WB6AIN, WB6DSV, W6-HQN, W6OAT, W6OWQ, W6PAA and W6RGG. (Apologies to anybody we forgot.) The NCCC Contest Forum, ably chairpersonned by Messrs. W1YL and W6PAA, was well attended and enthusiastically received by all and sundry.

Continuously variable audio selectivity from 2 kHz to 30 Hz; passes only tones near center freq of 800 Hz. Pwrd by ordinary 9V battery. See Jan. 1973 73 Mag glowing review: "... big difference between copy and no copy during bad QRM, especially if you don't have that expensive mechanical filter." Brand-new, but I don't have any need for it, so it's yours for \$10 (sells for \$17.95) (WIARR/6).

SPEAKING OF AUDIO FILTERS . . . Bill Zachary, WB6CEP, has conducted a research project on CW reception for a graduate course in Human Engineering at UC Berkeley. Highlights of the study include:

- (1) The ear's sensitivity is maximal at about 2-3 kHz; therefore, copy at a relatively high pitch under weak-signal low-QRM conditions.
  - (2) Hearing loss increases fairly rapidly

with age at relatively higher pitches but not so much at the lower ones, so modify (1) accordingly as you grow older.

- (3) Low-pitched tones cause much greater "masking," or QRM inside one's head, than do higher-pitched ones. Also, higher-pitched tones fatigue the ear to a greater extent than do lower-pitched tones. Therefore, copy at a lower pitch under conditions of extreme QRM.
- (4) There is a tradeoff between the ear's sensitivity and the effect noted in (3). The optimal CW copying pitch under QRM conditions appears to correspond to a frequency of 400-500 Hz.
- (5) The bandwidth of the "human audio filter" is less than 50 Hz for typical CW copying pitches under both QRM and non-QRM conditions.
- (6) The bandwidth of this "human audio filter" may be narrowed somewhat through practice.

A more detailed article on this topic is scheduled for publication (one of these days) in 73 Magazine. Copies of the original 40-page report are available on a loan basis from WB6CEP (Bill Zachary, 2705 Ridge Road, Berkeley, CA 94709).
