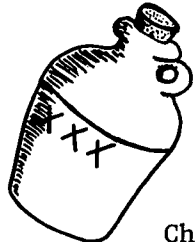

WB6CEP & Co. have lined up a rrrrilly big shew for us, the highlight of which will be a DX Contest forum. Bring your questions along and hear them answered as if by magic! What time was that 9K2 on 14207? Was the ST2 short or long path? What hour on 40 should have produced my best JA rate? Why am I such a rotten operator? For optimum results, bring your contest log to the meeting.

OM's, if you live in local Club area and don't attend meetings, you aren't doing your part to support the Club. If you live within 175 miles of Castro Valley but more than 50 miles from same and you don't attend at least half the meetings in a calendar year, then you can't submit your contest score on behalf of the Club. This is a tremendously important year for the NCCC -- do your share for your Club!

CHECK INTO THE NCCC 75-METER NET!

Every Tuesday evening at 7 PM local time, on or near 3815 kHz, amid the usual inconsequential chatter and obscene babbling that is the heart and soul of our wonderful 75-meter band, you will discover a group of your fellow NCCC'ers busily engaged in furthering the aims and aspirations of the Club. The quality of conversation is not necessarily any higher than that of anyone else on the band -- but it's our guys, gang! All Club members are encouraged to add to the QRM by checking in.

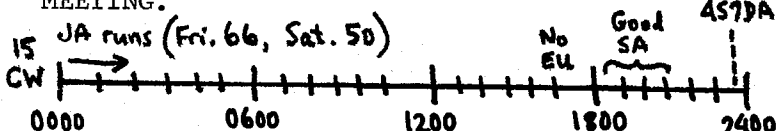
The NCCC repeater, WR6ADM, operates on 449.2 MHz input, 444.2 output. If quasi-CB is what turns you on, why not turn WR6ADM on. No net -- just spur-of-the-moment stuff. And it's a handy way to get your score to WA6DIL.

Clinics, Field Day, club-meeting programs featuring NCCC experts talking about all phases of contest and contest-related activity, DXpeditions to rare counties in the NCCC-sponsored California QSO Party, possibly a real DXpedition in CQ WW, picnics and other informal get-togethers, and the Erector Set antenna crew for put-up jobs.

On the operating side, our Number One priority for 1975 is to be the Number One club in the ARRL November Sweepstakes. FIRST PLACE IN THE SS! The potential is definitely there if we can get it all together in November. It will require determination, unity and effort on the part of every member.

The topic for the program at this month's meeting might well be described as "All You Ever Wanted or Needed to Know About the ARRL DX Contest." A panel of five stalwart NCCC contesters, representing an approximate cross-section of the membership, will guide the discussion.

First they will lead a band-over-time analysis of all bands, 160-10, seeking the answers to such questions as: When were the best runs and what rates were achieved with what classes of stations? When did good openings occur to which areas? When and where did good multipliers show up? etc. Every DX Test participant is encouraged to GO THROUGH HIS LOGS, SKETCH OUT HIS OWN BAND-OVER-TIME CHARTS (see example) AND BRING THEM TO THE MEETING.



The second portion of the program will be a question-and-answer session about contest strategy, operating and techniques. I suspect questions will run the gamut from "I run 200 watts to a tribander 15' above the roof -- when would be the best time to get on for 3-4 hours of fun operating?" to "What's the best way to break through a pileup on CEØZ?" BRING YOUR QUESTIONS (and some answers, too) TO THE MEETING!

Of secondary importance, but by no means a trivial matter, is the effort and expense involved in putting out this newsletter. It's silly to mail it to people who don't want it, so if you're in that category please let us know! (It won't hurt our feelings.)

To further ease the financial burden of producing this monthly mess, we ask that NCCC members living outside local Club territory (i.e., more than 175 airline miles from Castro Valley) ante up \$2 annually for their subscriptions to the JUG. Please send the money to our Sec/Treas, W6KHI, who will keep records and dun you again when your sub expires.

One way or the other, W1ARR/6 must hear from you by March 12 or you're offffff. Beware the dreaded Red Cross . . .

Being VP/CC is a never-ending task and I know I'm going to need all the help I can get. The best way is for you to keep me informed about your activities, plans and ideas.

The first thing I ask is that you fill out the questionnaire attached to this issue. It would greatly help Yours Truly to get a clear picture of our Club's picture for 1975.

The NCCC is fast becoming a power to reckon with, and with a bit of effort we could be among the top clubs (if not the top club -- Murphy's, beware!). To do this, we've got to

put our objectives first -- namely, by operating in the contests, and (above all) LETTING ME KNOW YOUR SCORES! NCCC INTRA-CLUB COMPETITION

This new format is intended to replace the team competition concept that we scrapped last fall. An example of how this competition works is shown in the next column over.

Official rules will appear in the March issue in time for ARRL DX Test results.

While the format basically follows the ARRL SS scheme, with a few special additions to minimize squabbling over the rules yet give recognition at other levels besides the very top, an important difference will be that you MUST GET YOUR SCORES INTO THE HANDS OF THE VP/CONTEST CHAIRMAN by the club meeting immediately following the contest, so that winners of the competition can be listed in the next month's JUG. -- WB6CEP.

EXAMPLE BASED ON '74 SS RESULTS

The Cheerios Kid (he knows his OATs) brought home the Bacon (or was it the other way around?) on both modes, with a fabulous 161K CW and 219K phone effort for a grand total of 380 kilopoints. Vy FB, Rusty!

Close on the heels of WA7NIN (W6OAT, opr.) were WB6AIN (operating at W6MAV and K6EBB) with 340K, and K6CQF (W6PAA, opr.) with 314K. WA6HAF (WA6GMR) at 140K barely beat out W6HJP's 131K with a fine phone effort in the low-power competition. -- WB6CEP.

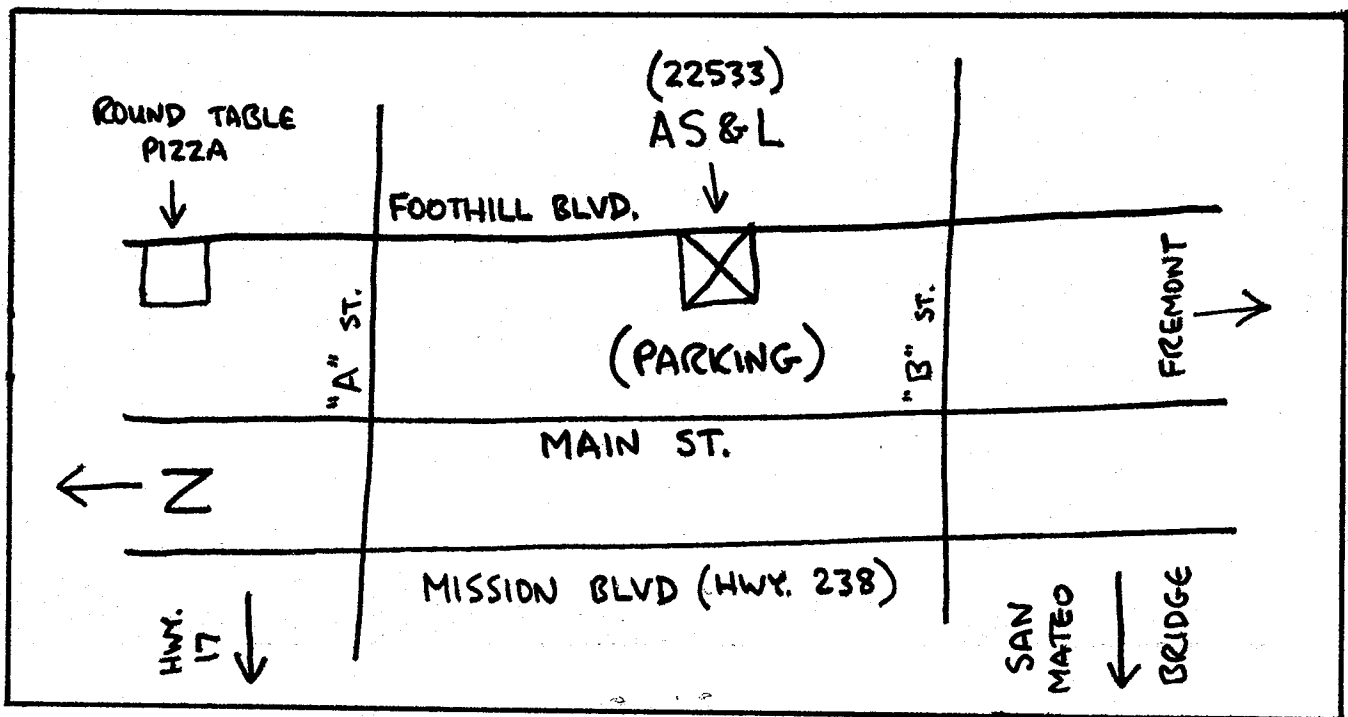

AN EPPSPLANATION. Every time we're just about convinced that nobody ever reacts to anything printed in the JUG, along comes W6-OAT reacting all over the place. This club could use a hundred Epps . . . er, Eppses (Eppseses?) Well, one Epp is better than \emptyset .

"WA6NLQ's letter raises some good points. Regarding the avoidance of duplicate DX QSO's, I'd suggest we go one step further than Stu has done and institute a contest-type Q-signal: QBF? In essence, this Q-signal asks 'Is this a valid QSO?' -- or, to make the query match up a bit more with the letters, 'Have we QSO'd BeFore (on this particular band and mode)?'

"During the January CD Party (CW) I actually tried using QBF. It worked! Better yet, it required no explanation to the other stations. Contesters are a sharp bunch and, I think, would be quick to pick up on a Q-signal that would benefit them. Look how fast the alphabetic shorthand for digits (T = \emptyset , N = 9, A = 1, etc.) caught on. Almost everybody uses it now (or at least understands it) even though I have never seen an explanation in print. Certainly there are enough of us in the NCCC that if we all just started using it, others would pick it up.

"Stu's second article asking for station descriptions is simple enough. The layout at W6OAT/6 consists of one 2-meter transceiver (Standard SR-C826M) plus mobile whip; one 450-MHz transceiver plus a 6-element beam; one TO Keyer; one pair of Superex headphones; and a toothbrush.

"Re WA9UCE's suggestion for an all-band

SS, I for one like it. I think the present format is a drag. Certainly the SS as now structured requires a lot more brute force than strategy or finesse. It's really a bore spending Sunday afternoon butting into other people's QSO's trying to coax non-contesters into giving you an SS exchange. Being able to work stations on different bands would at least keep the rate up and keep you busy for the whole 24 hours. CU on the 27th!"

SEDIMENT. Looking ahead to future club meetings: the program for March will feature a discussion of ARRL DX Test results and also talks on HF antenna systems; April's gathering will sport a program on receivers and receiver accessories. . . . W2IWC/6 has taken over the CQ contest column from W1WY. . . . DL7AV (via WA6PMK) warns that East European broadband FM jammers start honkin' daily at 1500 GMT on 7 MHz, making longpath EU-W6 QSO's extra-difficult at their end of things. . . . We have a few CQ WW and ARRL DX Test scores on hand but no space to print them. If more than a handful of members would turn in their tallies to the VP/CC, we could allocate enough room for them. . . . Next JUG deadline (for the March issue) is March 11; please have all material to W1ARR/6 by that date. Articles, items for the Bulletin Board (sell/swap/buy), station info, questions, comments -- anything of possible interest to your fellow NCCC'er will be considered for publication. . . . And be sure to fill out and return the attached questionnaire to WA6DIL. It's important! CU all at the meeting. -- 73, Bob, W1ARR/WB6GLF.

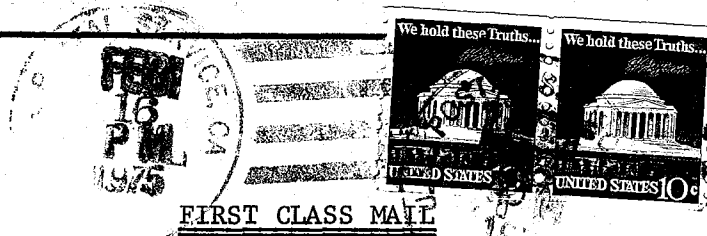
