ALL PRESIDENT BUT UNACCOUNTED FOR

WB6CEP, our Club's Effervescent President, will now regale us with his unique brand of Ceemingly Endless Platitudes (or, at least, that's our Cynical Educated Prediction):

Guess we were all lucky we didn't have to de home with the Editurkey after our Christmas/Awards Banquet. All he could say was "Goblet, goblet, goblet." Seriously, much deserved, O sagacious JUG Appurtenance.

I had a <u>fantastic</u> time at the Banquet and hope you did too. We were sorry to find that a number of Club actives and out-of-territory members were unable to attend for various reasons. Special tnx are due Masters of Ceremonies W6PAA and K6AQ, and especially to WB6-DSV for handling the Banquet arrangements.

As for SS, a final point-count was made after the Dec. 22 log-mailing deadline, based on final reports by the SSCCers and summary sheets received. It appears we missed 10 meg by a measly 25,000 points! We beat last year's total score by the end of the CW weekend alone, despite rotten 15M condx. Entries over 1K totaled 136, with 71 on CW and 65 on phone.

As for #1 in SS ... I called the Presidents of MM and PVRC on Dec. 23. WAIKID estimated Murphy's at 6½-7 meg and noted they were hurt 'dly by poor phone condx in New England ("the dfish Curtain"). W3GRF allowed as how PVRC hadn't really gotten it together yet but estimated 9.7 meg ± 200K; a more recent check with W3BQV puts them about 30-35K short of 10 meg. What with people failing to send in logs, and

losses in the mail during the holiday crush, it appears we will have to wait for Jim Cain's (WAISTN) final tallies to answer the #1 question. Keep your fingers crossed, OMs!

Looking ahead to the next big Club contest activity, WA6TLV (east of the Bay) and WAØENP/6 (west of the Bay) are honchoing ARRL DX for us and I'll leave the gory details to them. Our Club policy is that we are turning in an entry, and we ask dual members to make their own individual decisions as to which club(s) get their score(s) -- and we really encourage everyone to get out there and KB! A considerable improvement over past performances is anticipated, to say the least.

To sharpen our DX operating skills, we are co-sponsoring an ARRL DX Contest Forum with the Northern California DX Club on January 17. Since this meeting has an insert entirely to itself in this JUG, my comments here will be limited to pointing out the exceptional caliber of the Forum panelists, and to encourage you to come and bring along any DX-contest-oriented hams in your general area.

Finally, one detail that seems small now but will loom very large further on down the pike: reserve Nov. 7-8 and 21-22 for SS, Oct. 3-4 for the Cal QSO Party (to tune up for the SS). With all the experience we gained this year in putting on super efforts for these two top-priority contests, they just ain't gonna believe how we'll STOMP IN '76! -- 73, Bill

"Moved to my new QTH, a home 10 miles south of Reno on 2 acre, over the CW SS weekend, is no way could give any help, sorry" (W7-MRS) ... Conditions up here were deplorable, sounded like Murphy had put up an electron screen, plus having two teeth pulled day before contest started kinda messed up the situation" (K6KWN) ... "WA6JUD operated his first low-frequency SS from W6BSL and did a FB job" (WA6DIL) ... "Excessive heat was screwing up my keyer, so I kept it cool by opening a door to the unheated rest of the house" (WB6CEP at K6CQF). ... "How do I QSL XE2PAT?" (W6OAT).

"Line noise make things miserable for me both weekends" (W6RGG) ... "Our 'KB' slogan caught on so fast that even PVRCer W3LPL was heard to use it!" (WB6CEP) ... On phone, was sick almost all weekend, although OWQ and I did our best -- somehow we just couldn't seem to KB like we though we were going to" (WlARR/6).

WATS NU?

HAVE A WILSON FILTER TIP

The new model QF-l active audio filter from Autek is an extremely versatile piece of equipment. Three modes of operation are included: PEAK, NOTCH and LOWPASS. Three large knobs vary the mode, frequency and selectivity of the filter.

In the PEAK position, the bandwidth is continuously variable to as narrow as 50 Hz with extremely sharp skirts. Unlike other audio filters, the center frequency of the peak is also variable -- from 250 to 2500 Hz. This feature allows one to tune in several different stations simply by tuning the frequency control through its range.

The effectiveness of the QF-1 in the PEAK position is illustrated by an example. I tuned in an RTTY signal, adjusted the selectivity control for the narrowest bandwidth, and by adjusting the frequency control I put the peak on

the low note of the RTTY signal. I was astounded to find that I could no longer hear the high note -- it had completely disappeared! When I tuned the peak of the filter across the high note, I completely lost the low note. Astounding!

With the mode switch in the NOTCH position, the selectivity control varies the width of the notch and the position of the frequency control determines which audio frequency is to be notched out. This is the filter's most effective mode for eliminating any kind of carriers. I tuned in a strong foreign broadcast station in the middle of the 40-meter band, adjusted the frequency control until the volume of the carrier decreased slightly, then widened the notch until it was just the right size to "swallow up" the carrier. As a result, the carrier was completely eliminated, yet an adjacent SSB signal was 100% copy!

In the LOWPASS position, the filter eliminates all tones that are above a certain cutoff frequency. The frequency control varies the cutoff anywhere between 250 and 2500 Hz. This mode eliminates hiss and splatter quite effectively.

In conclusion, let me state that I think the QF-1 is the finest audio filter on the market. My hesitation at spending \$52.95 for a filter immediately disappeared when I was told (by W6DGH) that I would cost me much more if I were to build one myself. Apparently the designer of this filter spends all his time hunting for parts bargains.
