
practice will help to provide proper reognition to our members for their achei ements in contesting and familiarize us with a greater variety of contests.

The 1978 California Sweepstakes, uh... rather California QSO party again shows to be the top QSO party contest of 1978. A good number of participants both in and out of the state questioned when the NCCC sponsored party would be given major contest status!!! Anyone listening on 10, 15 or 20 meters at 1800Z on October 7th surely would have thought the November "SS" had started prematurely!!! This year's contest activity and scores were way up, new all-time high scores were set by K9BG (out of state), W6YX(N7MH op.) single op. California and N6KT/6 (multi-op.). Although activity and scores were up, 222 log entries were received, down slightly from 224 in 1977. Several BIG scores especially from California were not submitted. SEND in your logs guys, (my postman needs the exercise). In past years the NCCC has prided themselves in promising more than 200 different California stations participating in the party, this year a careful check of logs revealed that over 350 different California stations participated. (That's more QRM than in many of our states). Unfortunately no clean sweeps outside California were reported. Thanks in part to our mobile and DX-Peditionary forces all 58 California counties were activated at some point during the test.

CALIFORNIA COMPETITION

Top honors within the Golden state again go to Mike, N7MH operating the Stanford Univ. Club Station-W6YX. Now after winning an unprecedented third year in-a-row, Mike and Stanford's station are rising to All-American status. Can this be the start of a dynasty? Mike's effort was truly magnificent, his before dupe total was over 2,000 QSO's!! That's right, 24 hours and in a QSO party! Mike's average rate calculated to just over 82 QSO's each hour-fantastic. Close on the heels of W6YX in this year's contest was Dean, N6BV in S.F. W6YX and N6BV are all to themselves in the exclusive CQP 200k plus category. Dean's score would have easily won last year's competition. Dean made a clean sweep (along with only K6SE) and 1848 QSO's which represents the second highest all-time score. Following Dean came WB6DSV operating from the home QTH for once! Fourth place found Rob, WB6SHD operating N6RZ's mountain top station while Dave (N6RZ) operated at K6BJ. In 5th place we find the ONLY SOUTHERN California station in

in the top ten, K6SE, operated by Dennis WA60YV for 157k. Following Dennis, we find K6RV operated by Carl AI6V (what's that call) at 112k. Close on the pursuit of Carl came Bill W6TPH warming up for his record breaking "SS' effort with 105k. At eighth place and just above the 100k mark is Ron, WB6SXJ who turned in 101k in his first serious contest effort. Doc, WA6T00 barely added out Ken K6HNZ for ninth place, eventhough Ken out QSO'd him. Doc's two additional multipliers eventually won out with 60 points to spare out of nearly 100,000 points. Congratulations to all for making the competition so fierce.

OUT OF STATE COMPETITION

The 1978 CQP found Jerry K9BG again at the top of the out of state competition. Jerry's 1978 score of 66k represents a 13% increase over his 1977. In reviewing the K9BG log one can easily see why...the pipeline from California to Illinois on 28 MHZ seems to have paid off well. The K9BG score also sets the new all time high score (out of state) for the CQP, be sure Jerry will be at it again this October. The '78 CQP out of state title turned out to be a one man race with the balance of the top ten well below K9BG's record score.

A record number of logs were received from DX stations, actually a 37% increase. Many of the DX stations commented on the topic of asking California stations to swing their beam antennas away from domestic activity more often. It seems many DX stations, especially in Europe, are avid county hunters, they look forward to the CQP as a yearly event where rare counties can be found. All in all 120 logs were submitted from out of state. They include 16 DX countries, 3 Canadian sections and 41 states.

MULTI-OPS.

"This total will require a herculean effort to beat," these words from previous CQP writeups best describe great feats of accomplishment. With this in mind N6KT and a host of NCCC ops. amassed radios, antennas and towers to venture to San Benito County where a new all-time high multi-op. score has been established. Their eyepopping 2641 Q's and 58 (clean sweep) multipliers also establishes another all-time high score as well as satisfies the requirements for herculean mention.

DX-PEDITIONS

The CQP DX-peditions whether mobile or portable makes the activity rewarding and challenging for all participants. Again this year we should give special thanks to the hearty travelers who gave us the rare and medium rare county multipliers. County expeditions were made by-N6AU (Alpine/Mono/Tuolomne), K6OQ(Tutte), N6OM(Calaveras), W6TPH(El Dorado), K6BJ(Glenn), K6LL (Imperial), K6PJY(Lake), N6KT(San Benito), N6OJ(Sonoma/Mendecino), AA6DX (Trinity). Congratulations on a job well done!

Special thanks should also be given to the NCCC's own WB6RIU who mobiled through 14 different counties often giving out the only contacts from each rare county. In past years Andy has covered the Northern or Southern ends of our state, this year Andy concentrated on the Central Valley counties.

Indy was not the only NCCC'er to mobile through various parts of California, special thanks are also in order to N6BT, who with the help of a crack(up) team made up from N6TU, N6SF and N6KB, mobiled through the Northern reaches of California running lKW (at least) to a TA-33 driven element secured above the camper shell. Two stations were manned while in motion, and multi-multi mobile operation took place in several places.

CLUB COMPETITION

The CQP Club competition is broken down into two categories-in and out of state. The out of state winners for 1978--MAD RIVER RADIO CLUB. This group of highly enthusiastic contesters from Ohio will receive their plaque just in time to make plans on how to defend their title in the '79 CQP. The California state competition was won by the KB ers of the NCCC.
