HELLO RADIOSPORT FANS!

I'd like to introduce myself as the new Contest Advisory Committee representative for the Pacific Division, and take this opportunity to fill you in on what topics (controversial and otherwise) are presently being discussed. The Contest Advisory Committee (or CAC) consists of 16 active contesters who, as a group, advise the ARRL Board of Directors and the ARRL Awards Committee on matters relating to League-sponsored contests.

My aim as your CAC rep is to be active in insuring that your views on contest-related proposals are passed along to the Committee. As such, I hereby declare myself interested in your thoughts and ideas on ARRL contests. What are your likes? Your dislikes? Are there any rules you'd like to see changed? Or do you like things just the way they are? I'd appreciate your input, so please corner me at an NCCC meeting, or call me on the repeater, or on the telephone (415-689-7500). Or you may write to me at 1830 Polk Street, Concord, CA 94521.

Here, briefly, are the topics presently on the CAC's agenda:

- (A) 160 Meter DX Window Protection -- Should stations who operate in the 160 meter DX window during a contest be disqualified?
- (B) Club Competition Rules Changes -- (1) Should the present three-tier system be left alone, changed to more accurately reflect actual club membership, or abolished completely? (2) Are current rules regarding meeting attendance satisfactory, i.e., should a member residing less than 50 miles from the club's center point be required to attend a minimum number of meetings each year? and (3) Should members operating outside of their club territory be permitted to submit that score toward their club total?

(C) A contest on 10 MHz?

- (D) ARRL DX Competition Rules Changes -- (1) Should contest DXpeditions count toward the club aggregate? (2) Should there be a club competition for foreign clubs? and (3) Would it be appropriate to again try the world-works-the-world formula, as attempted circa 1980?
- (E) Spotting Nets -- Should single-operator entries be permitted to use spotting nets during a contest?
- (F) Canadian Multipliers -- Should VY1 and VE8 be considered as separate multipliers in ARRL contests?

In addition, the CAC will be recommending to the ARRL Awards Committee a rule prohibiting "solicitation of contacts during an HF contest by non-amateur radio means." So, if you were down to the last hour of Sweepstakes and you needed only Mississippi for a Clean Sweep, it would become illegal for you to get out your Callbook and telephone directory, and then phone an amateur in MISS to get him/her on the air.

If any of the above proposals either tickles your fancy or ruffles your feathers, I'd like to hear from you. I'll be conducting a poll on these issues most likely at the March NCCC meeting.

NCCC KB's IN THE NORTH AMERICAN SPRINT

"Wow!" is just about the only word to adequately describe the NCCC's participation in the February 1986 running of the North American Sprint.

No fewer than 34 Club members participated in the CW portion of the contest, while at least 35 screamed their lungs out during the SSB portion. Sprint entrants from all over the country noted the copious quantity of W6s to be worked, and rumor has it that the Southern California Contest Club, hoping to jump on the Sprint bandwagon, is forming teams to compete against our Club in the September event.

CW conditions were fairly good on all three bands. A solar storm occurring the day of the Phone contest, however, resulted in a virtual washout of propagation to W1, W2, and Eastern Canada. Nonetheless, congratulations are in order to K6GSS, K6CSL, WB6KBZ, and N6AUV for setting personal best QSO totals in an SSB Sprint. Similar kudos go to K6LRN, W6SZN, and WA6VEF (at N6RO) for CW. And a few of our brethren showed up to work the contest(s) even though they were not formally seeded on one of our teams. On CW, they were K6HIH, N6OP, AA6AD, AG6D, N6KT, AK6T, WC6I, KA6W, and N6CQ/3; and on phone, KB6KKH, AL7H/O, WA6IQM, CE3AQI/W6, AK6T, K6TMB, N7NG, and N6TU.

Be sure to submit your Sprint score (whether or not you were on a team) to insure your team position for the September running of the contests. CW entries go to Rusty Epps, W6OAT, 948-H Kiely Boulevard, Santa Clara, CA 95051, and SSB entries go to Rick Niswander, K7GM, 4520 N. Central Avenue, Suite 500, Phoenix, AZ 85012. All logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after the contest.

Twenty-nine people reported. After the introductions there was a short pause for those who wanted pizzas to order them.

Four membership applications were read and the applicants introduced. All four were voted into membership unanimously. The new members are: Carlos Nascimento, CE3AQI, Ron Roberts, WA6ITV; reinstated: Steve Hurley, N6JXV and Alex Rabinovich, KB6KKH. Welcome to NCCC, Carlos, Ron, Steve and Alex.

Ron, N6AUV, described work being done at AJ6V to eliminate TVI at a neighbor's home. An old worn out antenna and tv set are the major causes of trouble so a new antenna and a high pass filter are being tested.

Al, WB6FCR, the contest chairman, reported a score of 57 million for both WW contests with only 14 million for CW operation. He is hoping we can increase scoring in this mode for the WPX contests.

Gary, WA6VEF, and Bob, W6RGG, discussed the Sprint contests coming up the next two Saturday evenings. They have several 10 person teams for each mode and are looking for more.

The BOD meeting will be February 6 at 6:30 p.m. at the residence of AJ6V, Ed Radlo.

Ted, K6XN, announced he was looking for a Commodore duping program. K6HNZ, Ken, said he thought that the Jug was not giving enough information on meetings and other activities. After these comments, there was a short break for pizza eating while preparations for the main event of the evening were made.

KA6W, Ted Algren, presented a very well done talk on his work with a 160 m loop antenna and his design of a high gain pre-amplifier. Several informative slides were shown during his talk. Many of the LF members are hoping to follow up with Ted's ideas to improve their 80 m and 160 m operations. We all thank you, Ted, for one of the best technical talks we have had in a long time.

Jim Duffy, WA6AUE, turned in \$25.50 to the Treasury from drink sales at the meeting.

As it was well after 10:00 p.m., the Barbados slide show of K6ZM was put off to a later date.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

LOTTERIES AND OTHER FUN

People tell me I should operate other than on 40 CW and in contests. Well, I tried it and here's what I found:

An interesting phenomenon which seem to be very popular lately are the 20 meter lotteries. For those of you who haven't heard it, the way it works is like this: If you are interested in playing one of these lotteries, you find someone running a lottery and wait until he is looking for more players. Then you call, and if he is running a popular lottery, so do a bunch of other people. He gets a few callsigns, and if yours is one of them, you will get to play. When your turn comes, he will call you, using whatever piece of the call he got. You send him your entire callsign. You turn it over, and then the fun begins. You now have to think of your two digit lucky number. You can play anything, your age, the day or month you were born, whatever. You get a couple seconds of silence to make your final determination. When the person running the lottery says "over", you tell him your lucky number. If it's the one he was looking for, he says "good one" or some similar phrase, and you win your prize -- a card from a TL8/STO or maybe even an XU1.

If you find you cannot get through the pileup to play in some of the most popular lotteries, there is an easier way. An example is in order: Recently, there was an expedition to Niger, 5U7. Many people wanted to play for this one, since they had never won a 5U7 card before. The person running the lottery took a few players from one land, a few from two land, etc. Then he took everyone who was around who was a member of his radio club. There were no geographical restrictions on who could join his club, all you had to do was send some money. It's easy, and with some lotteries, since you are a member of the club, they will let you guess a second or even third number, so you can win (they like for you to win).

I'm going back to 40 CW, where skill produces QSO's instead of luck and bucks.
