AN ESSAY—WHO WAS THE REAL "SLIM"

I suspect there may be many stories about the origin of the term "Slim". Here's mine. There was no DX on, and it was the best game in town. Operators all over the country were committing their usual bad habits trying to raise Slim. And Old Slim kept roaring along about 35

wpm and seemed to enjoy all this friendly, goodhumored attention.

Shortly afterward, the Great Hugh Cassidy, WA6AUD, editor/publisher, squirrel fancier, window cleaner, etc., of the world renowned West Coast DX Bulletin, and early Board member of NCDXF, and later DX editor of CQ mag, picked up on the use of the word Slim to mean pirate. And thus it became part of the DXer's vocabulary.

Now I may be completely wrong. Maybe Cass began using Slim long before this event in Boston Harbor. At any rate, it was Cass who popularized the name Slim to apply to a pirate.

Anyway, that's my version of the origin of Slim. Don't be bashful or lazy or rely on the usual excuses that someone else will do it. If you have a different origin for Slim, please send it in or call. We would like to hear other versions.

Last issue I said something about getting Cass to write a paragraph or few for us. And I forgot to call him. I'm gonna do it this time and ask how he got to using "Slim". You say, "Why didn't you ask him first before you flailed away at your version?" To which I reply, "If I had asked him first, I could only have gotten one story out of this. But just in case, we have W6SZN who will take your deposition. Don't know what he will do with it, but he will take it. Fess up now! Let's hear from you, Slim.

P.S. True to the great tradition of investigative reporting, a reporter from the JUG just telephoned Cass. He will indeed be glad to give us the "True" version of the REAL SLIM next month. We may have to present his reply in serial form from month to month. Stay tuned.



FIVE MILLION POINT RULES

PURPOSE

This award is intended to give recognition for sustained efforts by NCCC members. All too often, club members compete with moderate stations, year-in and year-out, without a reasonable chance to win major awards. The Five Million Point Award is designed to rectify this situation.

Thisaward will be issued on a once-per-person basis.



RULES

- 1. This award requires the accumulation of five million points.
- 2. Point totals shall be accrued by the V.P.C.C. from copies of Summary Sheets which the contestant has submitted for a valid entry.
- 3.Any contest entry may be used for submission as long as the entrant is competing from NCCC territory.
- 4. It is not necessary for the NCCC to be participating as a club for your point totals to count toward this award.
- 5. Participation with a multi-multi or multisingle station can count for this award. To calculate your portion for this award, divide the total score by total operators and submit a summary for that portion of the total effort. This award will be serialized and of good design.

HOW TO ENTER

Send a duplicate copy of your summary sheets to the VPCC. In the case of club contests, two summary sheets should be submitted.—one sheet for the club entry and a second marked "Five Million Point Award". In any event, the summary should be clearly marked "Five Million Point Award".

Passband filters for multi-transmitter stations

The easiest and most effective way to prevent interstation interference during a multi-transmitter operation is to put a bandpass filter in the receive line. Such a filter passes signal only for a narrow band (say, 7.0-7.3 MHz), preventing strong nearby signals (on, say, 3.525 MHz), from overloading the receiver. These filters have been home brewed by several members of our club. Unfortunately, it takes quite some time to build a filter for all six bands 160 through 10. And it requires a spectrum analyzer and signal generator to ensure that the passband filters operate as desired.

Now, for the first time I've seen, a new company is commercially manufacturing HF bandpass filters (as well as many other types of filters) at a very reasonable price (\$26.95 each). Here's what it says in their 1990 Product Catalog:

"Rated at 250W PEP standard, these units are ideal for multiop applications, contests, Field Day, or for prevention of serious out of band interference. A combination of Cohn-type and separated link-coupling achieves over 60 dB of rejection outside useful rated passband, yet filters measure only a trace (less than .25 dB) attenuation loss inside frequency rated spectrum. Units are 50 ohm standard, non-polarized, non-dc passive, SO-239 connectors in thick, aluminum shielded enclosure."

Note to kW stations: Just put these filters BETWEEN your transceiver and your amplifier, and everything should work fine as long as you don't transmit on the wrong band with the wrong filter! These filters may be ordered direct from the manufacturer with a VISA card:

I've ordered some TVI filters from them, and I've been pleased with the rugged construction. A report comparing the performance of these and other bandpass, lowpass, and highpass filters is planned for an upcoming issue of the Jug.

New addition to NCDXF beacon net

The following item announcing a new three-band beacon is reprinted from the Summer 1990 issue of the NCDXF newsletter. We used no fancy computer hocus pocus for our cut and paste job—just the Jug editor's scissors and a glue stick.

Thank you, NCDXF, for the beacon, a valuable aid to all amateurs who like to work DX in or out of contests.

There is something new on the NCDXF 14.1 MHz Beacon Net! Now almost everybody in the world who is anybody, knows about the NCDXF Beacon Net on 14.1 MHz – a frequency designated by the IARU as a "beacon frequency". The net has been in operation for almost 10 years and has been widely discused and written about in amateur publications around the world. There are presently nine stations in the net which broadcasts a one minute message every 10 minutes, 24 hours a day.

Primarily the message consists of four nine second dashes at power levels attenuated in sequence from 100 watts to 10 watts to 1 watt to 0.1 watt. You will be amazed at how many times you will hear the 1 watt and 0.1 watt signal from a beacon across the world.

The stations in the net and their sequential times of transmission are: 00:00 4U1UN/B, 00:01 W6WX/B Stanford, CA, 00:02 KH6O/B, 00:03 JA2IGY/B, 00:04 4X6TU/B 00:05 OH2B, 00:06 CT3B, 00:07 ZS2DN/B, 00:08 LU4AA/B, 00:09 nothing, at 00:10 back to 4U1UN, etc every 10 minutes.

The new addition to the net is a new capability at W6WX/B which was recently converted to a three band beacon. After the W6WX/B one minute

message on 14.1 MHz, it switches to 21.150 MHz for the same one minute message beginning two seconds after the 14.1 MHz message ends. At 00:03 the beacon switches to 28.2 MHz for the same message again. If you can switch bands and spin the dial fast enough you may hear the beginning of each transmission. This is a rather fantastic system and very interesting to monitor.

The prototype three-bander was designed and built by NCDXF director W6QHS and master builder/designer N6EK.

The NCDXF hopes all nine beacons will be converted to the triband type beacon within a few years. Other beacons may be added to the net later. Just think of the interesting information this new three-band system will provide amateurs and researchers!



1990 California QSO Party Sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club

BEGINS: 1600 UTC October 6, 1990 ENDS: 2200 UTC October 7, 1990

Single operator entries may operate only 24 hours; off times must be clearly marked in the log and must be at least 15 minutes long.

Multi operator entries may operate the full 30 hours.

Stations may be worked once on CW and Phone on each band.

All contacts must be simplex; no MCW.

Single-op and multi-single entries are allowed only one transmitted signal.

All CW contacts must be made in the CW sub-band, except for 160 meters.

California stations that change counties are considered to be new stations and may be contacted again for point and multiplier credit. CA stations operating from a county line may be counted only as one QSO.

OBJECT: Stations outside of California work as many California stations in as many CA counties as possible; stations in California work anyone.

EXCHANGE: California stations send QSO number and county; stations outside of California send QSO number and state/province/country.

QSO POINTS: Each complete phone contact is worth 2 QSO points. Each complete CW contact is worth 3 QSO points.

MULTIPLIERS: California stations use states and VO/VE1-7 and VY1/VE8 for a possible total of 58. Out-of-state stations use the number of different California counties for a possible total of 58. CA stations on a county line may be claimed as a multiplier for any or all of the counties they give in their exchange.

TOTAL SCCRE: The total score is the number of QSO points multiplied by the total number of multipliers.

FREQUENCIES: 160 through 2 Meters excluding all WARC bands. CW on 1805 and 40 KHz up from the band edge. Phone on 1815, 3850, 7230, 14250, 21300, and 28450. Novices 10 KHz up from the band edge and 28450. Try CW on the half hour.

Try 147.54 MHz at 2000, 0000, and 0400Z.

Try 160 meters at 0500Z; 80/75 meters at 0300 and 0700Z.

DEADLINE FOR SCORE SUBMISSION: All logs and summary sheets must be sent to NCCC c/o Jim Duffy, WA6AUE, POB 8820, Truckee, CA 95737, by November 15, 1990. Please include a business size SASE for results. Entries of more than 200 QSOs must include duplicate sheets. For a CQP paperwork packet containing log and summary sheets, county abbreviations, and contest records, send a business size SASE to the above address.

AWARDS: Certificates to the highest scoring single operator entry in each CA county, each state/province, and each country, and each station that scores 100 or more QSOs.

Trophies to the top three out-of-state single ops; the top three California single ops; the top multi-single and multi-multi in California; and the high scoring single op and multi-op California county DXpeditions.

Special CQP Wine Award--The top 20 single operators in California, along with the top 20 single ops out of state, will receive a personalized bottle of Northern California Contest Club Private Reserve California wine. Wine winners who are under legal drinking age will receive a non-alcoholic personalized award.

Special Trophies--to the CA single op and out-of-state single-op with the most CW QSOs; the mobile single op or team with the most total QSOs; the high scoring low power entry (200 watts or less) in CA and out of state; the top Novice/Technician entry in CA and out of state; the top scorer outside the USA and Canada; and the top club in California (5 entries minimum--Northern and Southern Cal Contest Clubs are ineligible).


