ABOUT NCCC ROOTS

I been a thinkin' about NCCC. Always dangerous. Here's some of wat I been thinkin'. I want you to thimk about it too. Be prepared to offer sug-

gestions. That's all. We are not asking you to do anything but think and talk . . . yet.

HOW WAS NCCC FORMED?

I been a wonderin' about where NCCC came from. Let us get it down on paper. New members would like to know. I remember a boisterous DX Club meeting of yore with lots of stompin' and hollerin' and, next thing anybody knew, voilà, a new contest club was bornded. Then it seemed to me that most all the DX club members also joined the NCCC.

It would be nice if someone in the know would write this up. I am thinking of Jim, N6TJ, who was the obstritishun in charge of launching the NCCC. Will try to get his QSL manager, W6CF, to ask him to do this while he is still at ZD8Z. Then it would be good to have other early-timers to review the paper and add their recollections. Would be nice to print this in the Jug for all to enjoy. And who were the charter "Young Turks"?

WHO WERE THE PAST NCCC OFFICERS?

Try to think back. Who were President, Veep, Secretary and Treasurer when you joined the NCCC. Or have you been you president or other officer? Remember that year? Next meeting, if I can remember, I will pass around a paper and let you all write down the officers and their dates. Please search your memory. And I'll bet a lot of you still have most of the back issues of the Jug if we need to look things up. The W6CF International Library of All Known and Unknown Information is a last resort. Remind me to pass the paper.

THE JUG

I asked a few fellas at the Christmas Party what was the origin of the name Jug. I got several answers all about the same, plus or minus a little embellishment. If you think you know how the Jug got its name, please communicate. Better yet, take a few minutes and write it up. Thanks.

Let's get our whole act together.

ARE YOU HAPPY?

NCCC has been in operation 18 years or so, plus or minus the recollections of some of the Young Turks. Are there any short- or long-term objectives we should be looking at? All I know is that we have always concentrated on scoring well as a club in contests. Should we just concentrate on great scores or is there something else we might do as a club? What about helping other members upgrade their stations, etc. What are other contest clubs doing? If big contest club scores are our principal target, what can we do to improve those scores?

MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATE

I am not one for chasing all certificates, although I admit to chasing some of them because they are tough or fun, i.e., County Hunters, WPX, Oblasts, DOKs. These are certificates one has to work hard to earn. Even our own California Counties Award is tough unless you are a County Hunter.

But some certificates go with the territory—like membership certificates. Most organizations have a membership certificate of sorts. I generally file mine in a pile I have specially created for such items. It is not that I do not like and appreciate them and am not proud of the organization I just joined. I know they are there; I just don't have too much room. But if a neat one comes along, I can always make room.

THE CERTIFICATE

How come NCCC does not have a membership certificate? Or do we have one and I never heard about it? Maybe NCCC does not have a certificate because of reasons above! But suppose we had a unique one. Something you might expect from NCCC—that is, why be like all the rest?

Yes, we ARE the NCCC. I would think with all the computer brains and brawn we have in this club we could find some young fella to program a really neato membership certif. Maybe in color. Sure we could. If Bob, N6EK, can print our individual prize wine labels on the computer, why not a simple membership certif? Don't need a scroll border—everybody has one.

Why print it on paper? Must be sumpin else. Who needs another rectangular certif? Why not a triangle or a circle or 3 inches wide and two feet long. I dunno. Not too many words. Maybe in the shape of a mobile?

Think of something. I dare ya. But it should be computer generated, which seems altogether proper and compatible with the computer usage in contesting. So no expense, etc.

WHO GETS ONE?

Do not actually award the NCCC membership certificate until the member has contributed say a "milli-yun" points total in CQWW and/or ARRL and/or Sweepstakes, etc. Yes, of course, a person could join the club, under the present criteria for membership, as a person having an "interest in contests." Or something like that. No big deal.

You join the club as a full member in good standing. You can participate in contests in a gigantic style or a minimal style. But when you finally total a million points for the club, you are given the coveted membership certificate in the world-famous NCCC. Like you go to college for four years and when you graduate they give you a certificate. Same thing. Right? You do something to get the certif.

One milli-yun points is enough. We are not running a PhD program. It took me four years to get about 1.75 milli-yun points total, so I have compassion for everybody.

What do all you munchkins out there think of that one? Please say something to your Board of Directors at the next meeting. Son of a Gun, should we have some fun, away down in the bayou?

RECRUITING PROBLEM.

One more NCCC problem. I hate to tax you with all this stuff, but it is 1991 now and time to think ahead.

I have been doing a little recruiting of potential members, both new and a few former members who might like to rejoin. The reason most often given to me for someone's not wishing to join or rejoin is that the person does not wish to be cajoled or harassed constantly to produce big scores in contests.

Yes, this is a contest club. Why <u>not</u> prod people to go greater? Well, for one thing some folks like only CQWW or WPX and will go into those contests only. Others may like only ARRL or WAE, so will only go into those contests. Any member should be able to go into any contest he or she wishes to.

We cannot legislate what individual members must do. What percentage of the membership goes into the CQWW, one of the most popular of all contests? Some go into the phone contest and not the CW. Maybe we should be grateful our members go into any part of any contest. For most folks, a reminder that a particular contest is coming up is probably about all that is needed.

How hard an operator works at a particular contest may not really develop until after the contest starts. Some contests I have sworn I would stay up all night for, and then before 80 opens up the first night, my enthusiasm dwindles and goes down hill. Or, in other contests I have warmed up in a big way, and where originally I had intended to play around for a couple of hours I've wound up working very hard through the second day. Nobody cajoled me one way or the other. I just liked it.

Perhaps we have been too aggressive. In our phone calls before a contest we should keep in mind that the other fellow really may not be available or interested in that particular contest. Maybe we should say, "Why not join us in this contest for a while at your own speed or level of interest. Maybe you will find you like this contest and get more deeply involved after you work an hour or two. Try it. You might like it."

This would allow a recruit, or a person just rejoined, to find his or her own level of involvement and interest and go with that and be happy; that is, let each person compete right up to their own toleration level. As he gets his feet wet, just maybe he will come to enjoy some of those long hours some of us put in in our own particular favorite contest—with pleasure.

In time, recruits or re-joinees would get to know that the NCCC's major selection for a major push this year will be SS or WPX or whatever. The new folks will get the message and participate or not. Their choice. They know what the club is trying to do and will enter if this fits their tolerance level.

IN SUMMARY

In talking to folks who might like to join or rejoin NCCC, we should emphasize there is nothing in our bylaws that says they must enter a particular contest or score highly. It is up to them; and we hope, by example, to create a little enthusiasm for the contest we are promoting that year for the full club effort. If they do not wish to participate, fine. Maybe the next one. What you think?

MR. FERRERO, W6RJ, ACCEPTS APPOINTMENT

It has been announced that Mr. Robert G. Ferrero, W6RJ, long-time member of NCCC, graciously accepted appointment to be Chief F & F Jousting Tournament Referee at Visalia in April. "I am pleased to accept NCCC's appointment," he said,

"and I look forward to the intense competition of the tournament."

As if to emphasize his serious commitment to the tourney, Mr. Ferrero announced he would immediately commence a regimen of physical training. He reports he will trot up and down his mountain and go 100 strokes on his rowing machine daily before breakfast. Mr. Ferrero told the Jug, "I am getting in top condition because I know I will have to be in top shape to vigorously enforce all rules of the joust. I know what I have to do, and I am going out and do it!" You'd better believe it, Buster.

Mr. Ken Anderson, K6PU, was named alternate Chief Referee as backup to the rugged Mr. Ferrero, just in case. When Mr. Anderson learned the nature of the joust, he too announced his immediate turn to vigorous physical one-upmanship. He told the Jug., "I know what I have to do, and I'm going out and do it." That's what he said, folks.

ARE WE THROUGH WITH 'MILLI-YUN'?

I thought the fun-drive for everybody to make a "milli-yun" would be about over, now that CQ WW has passed. I said that before, because I thought ARRL was tougher to make a big score in total cw/fone. And at the moment I am too tired to get up and go across the room and dig out some old copies of QST to see what old ARRL scores actually were than it was in CQ WW.

On second thought, maybe we should keep the "milli-yun" as a good goal for all of us in any contest, combined cw/fone. I think combined scores in some of the other big contests might also total a "milli", i.e., All-Asia, WPX, CQ-M, WAE, etc. Look up some of those contests and see if a combined milli-yun is possible for a Casual Contester. Report back.

I'm sure Old Bob, N6TV, and the other Bob, N6EK, will rattle their cages up to a milli in any big contest. To say nothing of what the multis will do. This all may be diminished by the diminishing sun spots and the diminishing 10m band. But a milli is still a good goal.

So, what the heck, let's run the fun and keep thinking in terms of a milli-yun as a standard of high achievement for combined cw/fone scores in any contest for 1991. Not in Sweepstakes. I seem to remember that one can work an entire weekend for maybe only a killi-yun. I emphasize, however, that no one should be pressured into going for the

milli-yun. Just reserve it for your personal standard if you wish to have that challenge.

BIG QUESTION

The above brings up another semantic problem—

If a Billi-Yun = 10 to the ninth, and

If a Milli-Yun = 10 to the sixth, and

If a Killi-Yun = 10 to the third, then

What is a Milli Vanilli?

ARRL DX TEST REMINDER

If you are also a member of the Nor Cal DX Club, remember that individual NCCC members have traditionally assigned their personal scores in favor of the DX Club for the ARRL DX Contests. This is so the the DX Club may compete favorably versus the Southern California DX Club for the SoCal-NorCal Club competition in the ARRL Contest. The award is announced at the Visalia DX convention.

For CQ WW it was the other way. Members of both the DX Club and NCCC assigned their scores to NCCC. We tried to do battle with the Giant Clubs on the East Coast.

If you ARE a NCCC member, but NOT a member of the Nor Cal DX Club, then assign your score to NCCC.

Still Waiting for the Ideal Transceiver — Bob, N6TV

After reading W6ISQ's NCCC equipment surveys, W6QHS's FB receiver comparisons, QST and CQ Magazine product reviews of the Icom IC-781 and IC-765, Kenwood TS-950SD, and Yaesu FT-1000D, I've come to a startling conclusion: no one has yet made the ideal transceiver for the CW contest fanatic (me). Here's one reporter's opinion:

In my view, the ultimate single-op combination of transceiver and amplifier would have:

- 1).A rig with two large knobs, one for each VFO (like the FT-1000D)
- 2) Silent transistor keying (like the TS-930S) for superb QSK with a PIN-DIODE amplifier
- Automatic amplifier and antenna switching when you change bands (like the IC-781/IC-4KL/EX-627 combo.)
- 4) A 1 kHz CW filter in addition to 500 Hz and 250 Hz. 500 Hz is way too narrow when you're calling CQ, and 2.2 kHz or even 1.8 kHz is way too wide.
- 5) A Dial Lock button that turns the main tuning knob into an RIT control.
- 6) A CW sidetone that tracks the effect of using the RIT control. If I tune the RIT +0.2 kHz, the sidetone note should go up by 0.2 kHz, just as if I was using the old Drake twins. The ability to hear your own note at all times is very important. It

eliminates the need to press RIT-clear after every QSO because your ears tell you how far you've strayed from your transmit frequency. I sure wish they'd make a transceiver that did this.

Why not just set up two rigs and two amplifiers side-by side? Well, that's fine, but it means your body has to make a physical adjustment every time you switch bands. Furthermore, using two rigs means you can't fully use the rig-control capabilities of the CT software. Ideally, you should just press Alt-F1 to change bands, and the rig, amplifier and antenna should change bands automatically.

OK, so what if you can't wait for Icom, Kenwood, or Yaesu to come out with another radio. What's the best option TODAY? In this reporter's opinion, it is:

Icom IC-781 Transceiver.

Alpha 87A Amplifier (for the quiet QSK and auto. band changes).

Icom EX-627 Automatic Antenna Selector.

Cost? \$9,670! Oh well, back to the drawing board. Let's hear from the rest of you!






