

HI HOOOOO WILD BILL., ULTIMATE CONTESTER!

The stage is set as follows. Dateline Black Hills, Deadwood, South Dakota, August 2, 1874. The South Dakota Gold Rush is booming. The usual lawful and unlawful types are roaming the town. In Saloon No.10 sits James Butler Hickok, known to the world as "Wild Bill". Sheriff, gambler, a dead eye two-gun, gun fighter, with pistol or rifle. A Civil War Sharpshooter and spy for the North. Friend of Custer and Buffalo Bill, and also their scout. In other terms it's been said he was a murderer and not the law abiding sheriff that history has treated him as. The time is a fateful afternoon on the second of August, 1874, almost 120 years ago. Wild Bill is engaged in his customary vocation, gambling, at cards, with three other men. But on this fateful afternoon, maybe he got careless, maybe over-confident, who knows, he sat with his back toward the door.

I guess the moral here for us Contesters is: QRP is great if nobody else wants the frequency. Maybe there's another moral, but this one is good enough for now.

First Timer's Guide to

Electronic Mail and Internet

by Bob Wilson, N6TV

WHY SHOULD I CARE ABOUT INTERNET? I DON'T LIKE NETS

The Internet is not a DX net. It is a computer network that allows people world wide to exchange electronic notes, articles, software, and ideas. Of particular interest to contesters are two amateur radio forums: one devoted exclusively to contesting, and the other to DXing.

WHAT IS THE CONTEST FORUM?

Known electronically as "cq-contest@tgv.com", the contest forum is an ongoing, unmoderated, electronic discussion about many things of interest to contesters. It is the brainchild of our very own Trey Garlough, WN4KKN. Contesters broadcast all sorts of interesting things: contest announcements, high claimed scores (immediately after a contest, not months), contest war stories and excuses, good and bad experiences with rigs and antennas, updated country files for CT software, and pleas for advice on everything from antennas to rotators to headphones, to operating techniques. Advice comes from real experts like W6QHS, W0UN, ARRL editor NJ2L, NCJ editor WN4KKN, and lots of other people who just THINK they are experts.

The contest forum is also the place where contesters debate the kinds of things we discuss each year at the contest forum in Visalia, or in the National Contest Journal. Such debates have run the gamut: the pros and cons of contest rule changes, the length of contests, equalized contests, OH2BH's Alpha ad, legal and illegal ways of feeding multiple antennas, CT vs. NA vs. N6TR vs. W5XD's Writelog program, etc. Since it is unmoderated, some of the debates occasionally grow a bit long, but eventually someone says "enough already!" and the discussion moves on to something else.

It also has other uses. For the upcoming California QSO Party, I plan to post a "reserve your county" list to help drum up publicity.

What you will NOT see on the contest forum is: advertisements, requests for QSL information, and debates about who makes the best handie-talkie. Things do get a bit emotional at times, but in general the discussion has remained interesting, educational, topical, and even humorous.

WHAT IS THE INTERNET DX FORUM?

The DX Forum is similar to the contest forum in format, but it contains DX-related things: ARRL DX Bulletins, OPDX Bulletins, DXpedition news, DX QSL routes, etc. It is operated by Lyndon Nerenberg, VE7TCP/VE6BBM. Internet address: dx@unbc.edu.

What hardware do I need to get access to the Internet?

First, you do NOT need any amateur radio equipment or amateur license to get on the Internet. It is open to anyone world wide. From home, all you need is (1) a computer or a computer terminal, (2) a modem, (3) a telephone line, and (4) the telephone number of a service offering Internet mail.

From work, the computer terminal on your desk may be all you need. Most Bay Area high tech companies already have their computers connected to the Internet so they can freely exchange information with customers and others. If you are not sure, ask your friendly computer guru down the hall.

WHAT KIND OF COMPUTER DO I NEED?

It doesn't really matter. Any type of computer will do, PC, Mac, workstation, minicomputer or mainframe. All you need is some communications software. If you're on a very tight budget, you don't even need a computer. An old ASCII "dumb terminal" can work, but a real computer will be a lot easier to use.

WHAT IS A MODEM?

A modem (MODulator/DEModulator) is what you use to connect your computer to the telephone line. The modem translates the characters you type on your PC into audio tones (like HF RTTY). On the other end of the line another modem translates those audio tones back into characters. One side of the modem connects to your serial port (aka. "RS-232 port," "communications port," "COM1," "COM2", etc.), and the other side connects to your telephone line with a standard modular plug. Communications software in your computer directs the modem to take the phone "off hook," wait for dial tone, dial a telephone number, and wait for another modem to answer the line.

Many laptop computers come with a built-in modem. If your computer comes with a standard modular telephone jack, chances are you don't need to buy a modem because your computer already has one.

No special telephone line is required, but a second, separate telephone line dedicated to electronic communications (FAX and Internet stuff) is a real headache saver.

Modem speeds vary everywhere from 300 baud to 14.4K baud and higher. A 2400 baud modem is OK for Internet access, but you'll be much happier with a 9600 baud modem or more. Prices of all modems have fallen dramatically in the last few months. If you are not sure which modem to buy, ask the salesman at the computer store for advice, or read the reviews in PC Magazine.

WHAT KIND OF COMMUNICATIONS SOFTWARE DO I NEED?

Just about any one will do for simple Internet work. If you are accessing the Internet through one of the commercial

services such as Compuserve, MCIMail, or America On Line, software is usually provided. (Note: some commercial services such as Prodigy do not offer access to the Internet at this time. Be sure to check first before signing up.)

If you are accessing Internet through one of the many local Bulletin Board Systems (BBSs), you may need to provide your own communications software.

For DOS, many people use Procomm or Procomm Plus. For OS/2, PMComm or TE/2 work great. For the Mac, [ask Susan, KA6SEH].

HOW DO I GET FREE ACCESS TO THE INTERNET?

If you can't get access to the Internet at work, the San Jose Technology Museum of Innovation (The Tech), runs a BBS that offers a truly wonderful service: the ability to send and receive Internet mail for FREE.

How do I tell my communications software to call this BBS ?

Most communications software comes with a "phone directory" feature that lets you set up a list of BBS telephone numbers and associated communications settings. Enter the above information into the phone directory (get help from someone familiar with the software if you don't have time to read the manual). The COM settings shown above mean "No parity, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit." These settings are used by most of the modems on dial up BBSs. Set the baud rate to the maximum rate available on your modem (use 9600 if your modem supports it).

Tip: if your telephone line has the "Call Waiting" feature, you should disable this so that an incoming call won't disrupt your line and drop your modem connection. To do this, simply program the telephone number as "*70,408 279-7199" when you create the directory entry. "*70" disables Call Waiting for the duration of the current call only.

Finally, select the option which says "dial number" or "connect to BBS." Assuming your modem is connected properly to your PC and telephone line, you should hear a dial tone and the touch-tone codes as your modem dials the number.

If everything is working properly, you should soon see a welcome message appear on your screen prompting you to "login or type NEW for new users."

How do I log in the first time?

When you first dial in, type "NEW". You will be prompted to assign yourself a log in id and supply simple information such as your name and telephone number. For hams, it is very convenient to use your callsign as your id. Then, your Internet address becomes

<your call>@TheTech.com, e.g., N6TV@TheTech.com
You can give this ID to anyone in the world with access to
Internet, and they can then send you Electronic Mail (E-mail).

But, before you can send and receive Internet mail on this particular BBS, there is one small formality. You need to send a short note to the SYSOP (system operator) requesting Internet access. Just type the command FEEDBACK and follow the directions. When you dial in the next day, everything should be all set up so you can send and receive free Internet mail.

HOW DO I SEND A MESSAGE TO SOMEONE ON INTERNET?

Just type MAIL <Internet address> and follow the directions. For example, to send me an Internet message, type: mail n6tv@vnet.ibm.com

You will be prompted to enter a subject, then the text of your message. When you are finished, type "/" on a line all by tself, then "/S" to save and send the message or "/Q" to quit without saving. Any time the system prompts you to type something, just type a "?" and it will display a list of available commands. Your message will then be routed through the magic of the Internet and find its way to my computer terminal at IBM within a few minutes or hours, depending on the traffic load.

How do I receive incoming messages?

When you sign in, you will be told "you have [n] new mail messages." Just type the command MAIL and your mail will be displayed. BBS gives directions at each step.

How do I sign up to receive copies of postings to the Contest Forum?

Just type

mail cq-contest-request@tgv.com and enter "Hi Trey, please sign me up!" This is a special ID set up specifically for subscribe/unsubscribe requests. That's all there is to it. Next time you sign in, there should be a bunch of incoming messages. They are copies of messages people have posted to the contest forum. There are about 10 messages every day, more following contest weekends.

One of the messages may be a message from Trey which includes a copy of the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) file. This explains the ground rules of the contest forum. Recommended reading.

How do I post my own message to the contest forum? Just type

mail cq-contest@tgv.com
enter a subject, and type your message. This message will be
sent ("reflected") to hundreds of contest forum subscribers,







mail dx-request@unbc.edu and enter "Hi Lyndon, please sign me up!" Postings to the DX Forum should be sent to dx@unbc.edu.
