ALL THAT JAZZ! As we wait in suspense for the results of the 1999 ARRL SS (not announced in the May QST, as in past years), we're halfway through our major club effort in the WPX contest. We have amassed about 76.3 Million points in the SSB weekend, which looks like a a good start to me! Please commit to the CW weekend, May 26-28, in some category to assure that we maintain our #1 club entry, achieved last year. Have any of you not reported your score to us?

Effective this month, the score submittals data base, maintained by W0YK on the NCCC web site, will be the "official" tally for all club score functions. It will be used for listings in the JUG, input to the 5 Meg award database, and a reference for me and the BoD to keep track of the major club competitions where NCCC is serious. In order to assure the best possible accuracy, we need to have all members who submit a score to the NCCC reflector, or to the webmaster W0YK, check and verify the listings that Ed compiles on the web site. If you initially post a tentative score, please update it by again posting on the reflector or sending directly to WOYK. Also, if you have not posted a score for a contest where the club is competing in a big way, like WPX, please do so soon. More importantly, send your entry to the contest sponsor, so the club gets the credit. Deadline for WPX SSB is May 10. Submission details are available on the WA7BNM Calendar web site.

The club (YOU!) will soon decide on which major events the club will mount a major effort. The biggest issue is ARRL Sweepstakes vs. CQWW. We cannot do both seriously, though many of us are active in all four weekends in October/November. There are arguments in favor of each contest, which we will debate at the next meeting. Please think about your preference and voice your opinions on the NCCC reflector or direct e-mail to me or other BoD members.

There is a low level interest in maintaining the 75m club net on Thursday nights, even during the "off-season". We've had good participation during the SS Season, discussing strategies, software, antennas, 2R, etc. These topics have year-round interest and if some of you want to continue these discussions, I'll be there (or K6XX, W6ISO, etc.), 9 PM on Thursdays, near 3830. Or we could do it once/month for a while, 2nd Thursday. Your thoughts?

One more subject I need your input on: On the JUG front page we list two months' worth of contest calendar. I've been tempted to edit this down to a more manageable size, but contesters have different preferences, and what I think is an interesting event

may not coincide with your thoughts. Should I continue to list the whole nine yards, or prune it down a bit? The full calendar can be had anytime on WA7BNM's web site. This calendar is also available in e-mail format, which is easier to print out and post at your operating position.

Thanks to the nominating committee and membership for bringing me back into the club board scene. It's been about 20 years since I was VP/CC or Pres. There have been many changes in contesting in that time, I'm still learning and trying to keep up with the hardware and software innovations that have renewed my own interest in our sport. Please keep me on track with your thoughts on the general subject of contesting as well as club interests.

JUG EXCLUSIVE! INTERVIEW WITH K6XX

DOUBLE CROSS

Thanks to Ed, K6CTA, and last year's board for an extremely successful 1999-2000! Among our accomplishments during the great year just ended:

- Regaining the WPX club crown and blowing away the old record score of 126M with our 211,120,595 point total.
- Winning a CW Sprint team competition (finally!)
- Winning the 1999 Sweepstakes (apparently)

Last year presents a tough act to follow!

We fortunately have an excellent and experienced board consisting of three past-presidents, so we have plenty of folks with very intimate experience with running our club. VP/CC Ken, N6RO, is among the finest and best-known station builders and operators in the world. Secretary/Treasurer Kit, W6ISO, has been very active in club affairs for several years and is duly famous professionally for his technical expertise. The remainder of the "Bored" of Directors consists of Past President Ed, K6CTA, 1999 Rookie of the Year Kurt, K7NV, and expert ops/long time NCCC'ers Rick, N6XI, and Andy, AE6Y.

Those of you that make at least a couple meetings per year probably know me, since I have attended most of them over the past decade. In that time, I have been the VP/CC three times (including last year), and a director twice. This is my first "sentence" as prez. My radio experience started, as a pre-teenager, over 25 years ago when WN6HPF was issued. Upon upgrading, I signed WA6HPF for a year or so until N6IP was granted. That call lasted until the great callsign rush of 1996, when my fourth choice, K6XX, was purchased. The technical allure of radio and electronics helped determine my career path as an engineer; after discovering the fun and excitement of radiosport, contesting occupies nearly all of my "spare" time. My first contest entry was CQP in 1975.

What To Do?

Our club should set some goals for the year. I feel that we should emphasize the following, listed in order of importance.

- 1. Choose and win our major operating event
- 2. Have a great time as a club
- 3. Win the WPX club competition (and beat the OHs).
- 4. Increase our membership and promote radio contesting in Northern California and Northwest Nevada.
- 5. Improve communications, such as increasing JUG readership and maintaining the HF net.

NCCC accomplished all of the above last year, though there is always room for improvement on items #2, #4, and #5.

Major Operating Event

Please spend a few moments pondering which contest you'd like NCCC to enter this autumn. They generally boil down to two: CQWW & SS. Conventional wisdom states that we must chose only one, because a focus on both could seriously strain home life by committing all of us to four full-bore efforts in five consecutive weekends. N6RO is leading the discussion of this subject on our e-mail reflector, nccc@contesting.com, and would really like to hear your thoughts. Winning either contest is possible (since we have), but will require more effort this year than we have mustered the past few seasons. Drop a line to the reflector or speak your mind at our meeting Monday, May 8.

After we choose our major operating event, we should contemplate other contests. Obviously, we will KB in our own CQP: WPX 2000 is another probable. The peaking sunspot cycle makes DX contests much more attractive... WAT SA?

GOLDEN BEAR STEAMS

Most of you have heard of the yoyage of the Golden Bear, the California Maritime Academy's training/research vessel. They shoved off from Vallejo April 21. They stopped in Monterey Bay for a few hours on Sunday the 23rd, and then continued outward with scheduled ports of call in Mexico, Peru, Chile, Panama, Grand Cayman, and ending a two month cruise in New Orleans. They will be taking 15 CSU Monterey Bay Students who are enrolled in the CSUMB At-Sea program under the direction of Dr. Robert Van Spyk. Dr. Van Spyk is a ham radio operator who will use amateur radio aboard ship for both Pactor and Voice Communications back to Monterey and CSUMB during the cruise. He has enlisted the amateur radio community's help in setting up the station, both aboard the ship, and back at his home QTH where he has set up an automated pactor mailbox, and an automatic gateway to internet email systems.

I have already consulted with experienced DXpeditioner type hams wrt antenna solutions aboard the Golden Bear, which is a huge ship, about 500 ft. long, and containing 2 prominent radio masts 150 ft. apart, and about 120 ft. above the water line. Access to the ship in Vallejo was limited, but installation of several dipoles, including dipoles, coax, halyards, pulleys, etc. was completed. There was already a long wire antenna available for amateur use, and Dr. Van Spyk has an automatic tuner to utilize this antenna. I personally prefer resonant antennas, and so installed the dipoles. Also, the resonant antennas allow use of a desktop amp, which I supplied. The automatic antenna tuners can't handle QRO. I have made up dipoles for 40, 20, 15, and 10.

You can see a picture of ship by using Alta Vista, and using "Ship Golden Bear" (in quotes). The Honolulu Star Bulletin has a photograph which will come up.

The CSUMB class has quite sophisticated Multi Media Tools, and some brilliant minds to document this cruise, and the student group in charge of the on board communications will be creating a Presentation quality CD-ROM based video of this cruise with special emphasis on Amateur radio communications capabilities and aspects. This cruise is only the first of many planned for future CSUMB curricula.

I have shown the highly motivated, computer oriented students a number of computer applications towards ham radio (antenna modelling, propagation modelling, NCDXF beacon monitoring, digital modes, etc. and they really eat this stuff up, and are excited about it, and plan to include these aspects in their multimedia production after the cruise....

We at N6IJ will be publicizing the trip locally, and will entertain visits by young people to come to N6IJ and speak to the students aboard ship.

Someone mentioned that this would be a good QST article subject, and I would entertain a volunteer Czar to head that, if you want to....

We are working on skeds to set up between the ship and here, so will keep those interested, posted.

Let me know if you are interested in being kept updated on this cruise.

BTW, for those of you planning Extreme DXpeditions, it occurs to me that you might be able to negotiate with this very capable and highly used world voyager ship, for transport to your Heards, Navassas, Peter 1s, etc... Each student's passage fees are not cheap, but extremely less expensive than an equivalent passage aboard cruise ships, and the like. It seems to me that this ship solicits collaborations between the Californian Maritime academy uses (the prime users) and other academia/research types... perhaps DX peditioners too... in order to spread the expenses over more persons.

The Golden Bear Steamed out of the Monterey Bay Sunday afternoon, amid whitecaps and clear skies. We plan to communicate with them a number of ways during their 2 month voyage. One, is via wireless email...wireless, for obvious reasons. This is no mean feat on HF radio, but the students aboard the Golden Bear have done it.

The other is via amateur radio voice communications. We at the marina amateur radio contest Station (MARCS) will schedule visits to the station, for voice communications between young (and young at heart) people speaking directly to the students and scientists aboard, microphone to microphone. If you are interested in either of these activities, contact me. If you wish to be added or removed from the GBear email list, I can do that too. Check out their website for the latest updates:

There is also a website run by the maritime mobile net (14.313 MHz) which will plot daily positions of the ship, on a web map, during the trip. Hams can check the MM net on 14.313 for progress reports.
