Go north on Highway 29 into Vallejo, turn left onto Georgia Street, go two blocks and turn right onto Sacramento Street. Here is a partial list of things I could write about at length if I weren't late:

Recruiting: W6ZZZ and K6UFO are doing a great job for the club here, together with N6RCE for CQP. WX5S is also involved with making phone calls, and looking for a few good people to help him. The idea is to have every active contester (and almost every semi-active contester) in our ARRL area be a member of the club before November. Please talk to your friends and colleagues about this. Resources for talks at local radio clubs are available on the NCCC web site.

COP: Publicity is out, and beginning to appear in other club newsletters and contest listings. Publicity packages were mailed. N6TV is collecting county expedition information. What are your CQP plans?

NAOP: We fielded five (count 'em, five) all-NCCC-member teams for each of the CW and SSB sections. This is a great activity level, unsurpassed in the nation. Thanks to team members, and to

coordinators K6DGW (CW) and K6IF (SSB).

NCJ Sprint: The Sprints are coming soon. Practice, practice, practice. How best to practice? Participate in the NCCC CW Network Sprint (NS) Thursday evenings before the NCCC net. The 20-minute minicontest runs at 20 wpm or below for the first ten minutes. N6ZFO coordinates NS. W6RGG is coordinating teams for the CW Sprint. Who will be our coordinators for SSB and RTTY?

Antennas: The summer is almost over. I actually prefer antenna work in the autumn when the sun seems cooler. Get them up now.

Logging Programs: If you are planning to update your logging program, do it now. The hour before a contest is NOT, repeat NOT an appropriate time to change your software.

Logbook of The World (LoTW): Try it, you'll like it. I uploaded 13,000 Qs and immediately "received" 2,700 OSLs.

Deficit: Our club expenses are under control, but our income for this year is still below budget. All ideas (and moneys) to the Treasurer.

Vallejo Meeting (September): The September meeting – featuring a Sweepstakes program -- will be held on 11 September at China Wok in Vallejo. Directions are on the web site. This restaurant is owned and operated by protégées of W6OAT. I've eaten there: warm family atmosphere; delicious Chinese food. I hope that all members will try to get there, especially those from the North Bay, Sacramento, and the Central Valley.

Al, AD6E's, program was about CQP. It should be titled everything you ever wanted to know about managing this contest but didn't have the time to ask. This single weekend contest is a nine-month effort on the part of Al and his volunteers.

K6RB – By The Beach Rob Brownstein, K6RB

I was planning to do a protracted profile on ZF2NT for this issue, but to do it justice I need a lot more time. Also complicating things, I had cataract surgery on Thursday,

August 26th, so JUG editing had to wait until Monday, August 30th. So, I decided to take Ed's (W0YK) advice when I approached him to do a station profile. "My set up is such a mess, Rob, why don't you do one on your own station?" So, here goes.

I bought this 1/3 acre lot in 1984 specifically to build a house with room for a "decent" antenna. With the house completed in July 1984, I had already ordered a Tri-Ex WT-51 crank up, a KLM KT-34XA, and a HAM-M rotator – all delivered and set up in August 1984.

At that time, the station consisted of a Ten-Tec Omni-D and an Ameritron AL-80 (the original). I took advantage of a decent station to finally get my WAS and DXCC CW awards. At the same time I began getting my feet wet in contesting.

My first real contesting experience was as K2UMU/4X in the first Holyland DX Contest in the spring of 1973. I was living near Haifa, on a kibbutz, and had taken my ol' HW-100 and power supply with me. While there, I built a homebrew 15-meter delta loop, hand rotated, and mounted 18 feet off the ground on a 1 ½-inch galvanized pipe. For the other bands, I used a 300 foot wire, 30 feet off the ground, and an L-network tuner. I placed in the top ten in Israel in that contest.

Upon returning to the US in 1973, I spent the next 11 years, in lots of places, with the HW-100 and wire antennas. Contesting? Why bother?

So, fast forward to 1984. I did Sweepstakes that fall and loved it. I did the ARRL DX contest (both modes) and loved it. I was hooked. By 1985, the Ten-Tec was replaced by an IC-761, and the Ameritron by an LK 500-ZC amplifier. I was cooking. I think I won my first-place CQP award for Santa Cruz County that October and was thrilled.

So, from 1984 until 2002, the station was an IC-761, the LK 500 ZC, and KT-34XA plus half slopers for 40, 80 and 160.

In 2002, I sold the IC-761 and bought a used FT-1000D. In 2003, I sold the LK 500 ZC and bought a used Alpha 87A.

During the summer of 2002, I replaced the KLM with a Force 12 C31-XR, MAG 240N and the 10' galvanized mast was replaced by a 20' chromoloy mast.



The main antennas are a Force 12 C31-XR at 50 feet and a MAG 240 N at 60 feet. Not visible are the half slopers for 80 and 160.

For the contest seasons of 2002 and 2003, that was the set up. But I was intrigued by the prospect of SO2R. So, starting over the summer of 2003, I bought a DX Doubler switch, two ICE 419As, and band decoders.

Just three months ago, I got radio # 2, another FT-1000 (minus the D). Radio 2's amp is (for now) a Collins 30L-1 with QSK-5 for full QSK. And the antenna for radio 2 is a Hy-Gain AV640 vertical mounted on the chimney.

CW and NAQP fone. I'm hooked. I loved it when the run rate began dropping and I started alternating Qs between radios.

In 1984, I was the contest king of Santa Cruz – there were no other serious contesters to be found. In 2004, I have Ed, W0YK, and Bob, K6XX, establishing the pace. And, though I'm no longer "number one," the friendly competition has urged me on to higher scores than I ever earned before.

In retrospect, after 46 years of fairly constant ham radio activity, I have to say that I never enjoyed the hobby more than I do now. And, I've never participated as long or as actively in any club as I have in NCCC.

Trey, N5KO Elected to CQ Contest Hall of Fame

Trey Garlough, N5KO, was inducted into the CQ Contest Hall of Fame at the Dayton Hamfest.

The following is the nomination letter as printed in NCJ September/October 2004:

Dear Bob,

This is a Latin-American multinational nomination of Trey Garlough, N5KO/HC8N, for CQ Contesting Hall of Fame.

He is a life member of the American Radio Relay League, member of Quito Radio Club and Northern California Contest Club and founding member of the Boring Amateur Radio Club and Galapagos Radio Sociedad.

A ham radio Internet pioneer, he was the creator of many Internet mailing lists including CQ-Contest@Contesting.com and 3830@Contesting.com. He was also a founding member of Contesting.com and eHam.net web sites. Trey continues to provide web hosting, Internet mailing list services and technical guidance to scores of amateur radio contesting and public service organizations.

He is a former Editor (1993-1994) and CW Sprint Editor (1989-1993) of the National Contest Journal, and was a Team World (1966) and Team USA (2002) selection to the World Radiosport Team Championship.

He unselfishly has given his time to some less notorious activities that still have an impact on the way we contest today, as he was the leader of the collaboration between contest sponsors and logging program authors that resulted in the creation and adoption of the Cabrillo Format. N5KO also has been a key contributor in the conversion from paper log to electronic log processing for numerous contests, including all ARRL and CQ events.

As an operator, he won the 1976 ARRL Novice Roundup, was USA National champion (CW Sweekpstakes) three

consecutive years (Top Ten 10 times) and has placed in the Top 10 of the CW Sprint 15 times.

He has placed in the To Ten single op all band in CQWW CW nine times from the southern hemisphere. This includes his overall victory in 1999, which was notable in the following respects: 1. world record, 2. only CW world champion from southern hemisphere in past 30+ years, 3. only CW world champion from Pacific Ocean in past 30+ years, 4. first single op to achieve 7000 QSOs in a 48-hour contest.

As an operator, N5KO has achieved 15 World #1 results in CQWW (nine world records) and 10 World #1 results in WPX (eight world records), many of them as multioperator with new and experienced contesters.

Trey is not an American coming south looking only for QSOs, he is a man who learned how to speak our language because of radio, an amicable competitor, a colleague always willing to share, a patient Elmer and above all a good friend.

In many ways, he is one of us and this is why the Latin-American contesters and DXers present Senor Trey Garlough to the CQ Contesting Hall of Fame.
