JUG TO BECOME BLOG?

I also have a possible volunteer for the Jug editor job. We are also trying to decide if we should redesign the Jug as a blog. I don't know much about blogs. Can anyone make suggestions about whether a blog would make sense?

CQP:

Let's thank Chris N6WM for managing a fantastic CQP. It was a blast. I would also like to thank all the operators who made a superhuman effort, especially the county expeditions. The publicity campaign apparently was very successful in Europe, as everone reported being deluged with EU callers. Now that we have momentum in EU, maybe the next frontier is JA.

This year, JA participation was dampened by a serious typhoon. Maybe we can publicize the contest in JA next week and get them to turn out. I worked a smattering of JA's off the side of my beam. With EU, I actually turned the beam toward EU and announced that I was beaming Europe. The club competition was fierce and the Motherlode club is no longer a shoo in. (Your president is also a member of MLDXCC). Finally, I would like to acknowledge the wine contributions, which should amp up interest in the contest.

There is a lively debate taking place on the reflector about fine tuning the rules. I am very encouraged by the enthusiasm here, whether or not we actually end up changing any rules. I am not so sure that the present rules are "broken" and need fixing, but lets see what ideas come forth.

Also, let's try to get something going in VE5 land next year. Some VE4's proposed an L-expedition, but VE4 is also very thinly staffed, so we need to plan that carefully.

PROCESS FOR AMENDING BYLAWS:

Scott W6CT is active in politics in the Libertarian Party and is something of an expert on such things as Robert's Rules of Order. He is going to draft a proposed change to the process of amending bylaws which would replace the mail in ballot system with a town hall type process where a suggested amendment would be published in the Jug, or NCCC Announce, etc for consideration by the members. A future meeting will have an agenda item concerning the amendment.

A sufficient amount of time between the announcement and this meeting will allow discussion on the reflector.

At the meeting, in person discussion in real time will allow the amendment to be fully hashed out. Amendments to the proposed amendment would be allowed to fine tune it. Then a vote would be taken at the meeting, yes or no. More on this in the future. The hope is that an improved process will make future amendments go more smoothly than the most recent amendment.

PACIFICON:

I would like to thank the volunteers who manned the table at Pacificon. We handed out a good number of membership applications. We will have to see how fruitful this effort turns out to be. I spent some time at the table myself and tried to learn how to break down "sales resistance". Some people admitted to being mildly interested in contesting, and some even operated CQP last week.

The resistance part came down to various factors:

- 1. Lack of a good station
- 2. Insufficient operating skill. Low rates are a drag
- 3. Insufficient time to operate in a 24 hour contest like SS.

I tried to explain that our crack operators will help elmer the newer guys coming up, and they are not there to denigrate them. The other issues can possibly be addressed by offering them operating slots at well equipped stations. We might start them out in an interesting, but non critical contest, such as All Asian. If they don't run up a big score, no big deal. Perhaps next year we could prearrange some operating slots in Sweepstakes that we could post at Pacificon. Prospective members could sign up on the spot for these operating slots. This might be more effective than an abstract offer of station access. The time issue is also addressed by offering 2 or 3 hour shifts. A few hours at a big station might very well produce more QSO's than the operator could manage at his home station with wires, and the fun factor would be a lot higher. Running pileups might increase the chance of catching the contest bug.

K6GHA had an interesting angle: the club is an opportunity to meet a lot of high power silicon valley engineers and executives. Although not directly related to ham radio, this might work to pull people in.

I would like to congratulate the many NCCC presenters at Pacificon. I am wondering if, in the future, we could get away with having them include a little "commercial" for NCCC at the end of their talks. I was greatly impressed with the talks in general, whether by NCCC members or not. There was an atmosphere that Pacificon is special, being in silicon valley, and is not just another regional convention.

SWEEPSTAKES:

Byron N6NUL will be sending out a paper tri-fold mailing to members active in SS in previous years to remind them to get on the air. We will see how productive this is. The board felt it was worth the small amount of money needed to fund it. Everyone please make a maximum effort for SS, and remind other members about SS. If you are an operator in need of a station, or a station owner in need of a guest op, please notify Byron so he can do matchups.

What a month!

First off, CQP once again dominated the air waves the first weekend of October! Good conditions and lots of DX stations were a highlight for me personally, as were reading about all the exceptional County Expeditions that went into the field to operate! Among them were a few truly epic scores.

The NI6T multi-multi expedition to Tehama County looks like they will break their own previous record with 3660 claimed QSO's and 526,623 points. As Jim K9YC pointed out in his write-up, "six old guys and one slightly younger one did all the work" and set up four (yes, 4!) dedicated stations and truly KB'd all weekend! Well done Glen W6GJB, Jim K9YC, Garry NI6T, Tom N3ZZ, John K6MI, Rich N6RNO, Rob K6RB, Ranjeet KK6GRP, and Tom WB6HYD.

Continuing with the mind-blowing scores was the N6A multi-multi expedition to Alpine County. Richard N6DQ, Joanna K6YL, Kristen K6WX, and Daniel KJ6SEE used 3 stations sharing a hex beam through a tri-plexer to turn in a possible new county record with 3097 QSOs and 423,458 points! Both efforts were terrific, and they might not when high score for M/M County Expedition HP! The K6Z expedition to Inyo may well take that honor with a claimed score of 638,696!

And you can go on and on: N6O at N6RO was within spitting distance of a megapoint. Bob K6XX and Bob N6TV were not only both heard on phone, but both claimed more phone Qs than CW Qs! Shocking, I know.

But now, CQP is over until next year and it is fast approaching time to concentrate on the first of our 2 club Focus Contests: ARRL Sweepstakes! For focus contests, remember, we expect every club member to do their best to get on the air and submit a log no matter what the size.

At the club meeting this month I will be presenting our plan. Here's a preview: first, call every NCCC member you know that has not submitted a Sweepstakes log in the past few years and convince them to turn on the radio. Second, read the Sweepstakes Handbook available on the website. It's got it all.


