

that he was causing a problem. We don't know what to do next.

Answer: The Federal Communications Commission says that when a telephone responds to nearby radio transmisi sions, it is not functioning properly. The FCC does not require telephone manufacturers to have any radio interfer ence protection, says S. Marti-Volkoff, FCC engineer in charge for the SF region. Marti-Volkoff says people who own phone equipment should contact the manufacturer for help. He says there are a number of filtering devices that can be purchased to reduce radio transmissions in tele phones. A copy of the FCC information bulletin on the subject is being sent to you. Others who want a copy should contact the FCC, Field Operations Bureau, 3777 Depot Rd., Room 420, Hayward, CA 095454"

### DX Antennas

For DX, hang those 'tennas high, into blue and windy sky; else waves aimed low, horizon raking will be weak; few pileups breaking.

For, low-angle radiation gives low path attenuation. Because skip-length is the best, you'll be heard above the rest.

Some say 'tennas that they know themselves produce radiation low. But height alone sets angles; heck, convince yourself with Mininec.

You may think I, in particular do not favor radiation verticular. It's true! Above 5 Megs, I've found much of the signal just heats the ground.

Antenna designs, horizontal variety, include examples of great notoriety. Some are planar and quite conventional; others, like quads, are three dimensional.

Quads are known to have advantages but not in terms of weather ravages. Yagis' metal tubing tapers help them stand climatic capers.

In pileups monobanders win, but if you lack the room for them, triband beams, trapped or tromboned cover the bands we formerly owned.

For the new, the bands from WARC? Continuous coverage: more than a lark. Think six- or seven-band log periodic. It's out of the question, you feel? Idiotic? I know your attitude, as in life, reflects your needs. So let's not strife. If winning at contests you hold dear, don't even think of multiband gear.

For DXing, though, 20-meter performance may not outweigh all-band conformance. You need new bands 'cause believe it or not, for all-time new ones, the WARCs are hot.

What about low bands, 80 and 40? Assuming you don't own a ranch in Del Norte, listen on transmitting IVs and slopers and you'll only join the QRN gropers.

But if you've an acre or two that's delirious! For receiving, at least, you can get serious. You'll have the best of receiving leverages; just by installing a crossed pair of Beverages.

What about loops in their multi-shaped forms? Current near ground, the earthworm it warms. Just cut off the bottom and feed at the top; put more of the energy in your skip-hop.

Of course, when we talk of a dB or two, no one can tell just exactly who's who. For a large part of ham designs noted, antenna performance is just anecdoted.

But now you can put on our desk a new tool, to keep you from being a seat-of-pants fool. A computer will test each assumptions' validity, making warranted claims your proclivity.

You can fiddle, what if, with the spacing and more, while gain, with YO, you'll be raising for sure, and try many things on the length of your boom. The results are the best you can do in that room.

Will this end the tests; 'tenna A, 'tenna B? Only time will tell; we'll just have to see. But my guess is no; those tests serve a need, making computers reality heed.

Putting 'tennas on towers, up so high takes skill and know-how; that's no lie. And climbing those towers, working at risk, is not like something you do on a disk.

Regardless of modeling computations real antennas are parts of a stations. With feedlines, baluns and paraphernalia, whose bolts, mostly sinister, wanna impale ya.

And theory's essential, you know why, but 'tennas on towers, hanging high, are special sights, which please the eye, as sun glints metal against the sky.

Dxers' and contesters' tall arrays, far advanced, in so many ways, can make one forget, but no one should, that first antenna. Was it mostly wood?

Remember: homebrews can work quite well. and even a slack-wire quad from hell may be the pride, may be the joy, may bring elation, a DXer's toy.

So when you pass a DXer's location stop and admire; it's worth hesitation. If more than one pole, high and rotatable; a contester's station, undebatable.

Single low mast, with tribander beam? Hints of a tyro with a tyro's dream. If so, reminisce on your first YN; the miracle you thought you did back then.

Compare with that, a contact indecent, made in times very much more recent, when DX that was so very rare could only be had in a listmaster's lair.

Perhaps when viewed in such perspective, you'll agree, in moments reflective; that antenna work can bring joy, but mostly from the skills you employ. And though it's nice in pileups snagging rare ones for your later bragging, if done successfully, credit your skill and maybe the fact you live on a hill:

And maybe your KW runs a bit red and maybe your nights are not spent in bed but yes; your 'tenna does make a difference. Sometimes a pileup is won by a whifferance.





This month Cass tells us how to get the buzzers out of their transportation box and into a hive. Apparently scent has something to do with it.

#### TRANSFERRING BEES

However, use of a floral scent will often attract foraging bees. They follow their noses, looking for the tank cap on the target, that big flower with the good smell. They are going for all of that nectar they are smelling. "Go for the gusto!" you can hear them shouting if you get close and listen. Actually, while it may be hard to understand, it is not you they are interested in, it is that flowery smell. Bees are always interested in good grooming and nice smells.

How do you put them into the hive? Very easily. It is a good time to invite any skeptical neighbors over to view your newly found mastery over the denizens of the wild. It is the moment of truth.

You will already have your new brood super set up in a good secure place, facing the morning sun but possibly with trees for afternoon shade in the hot months. You will find a spacer to put atop the super will be helpful, this being just an empty super or a frame of the same dimensions as the super to allow four or five inches of space over the super. If you are starting with two brood supers, have them both in place.

You pry the piece of board locking the ration can into the shipping package and lift the can just high enough to slide out the queen cage. Inevitably will also get a couple of dozen bees on the loose but just ignore them. Again, they will be more interested in the queen than you. There usually is a cork retainer over a sugar plug in an escape hole on the queen cage. You work the cork plug out. carefully run a pin through the sugar plug without impaling the queen and you are ready to go.

You hang the queen cage between two frames by bending the thin metal retainer strap, you then pull the ration can out of the shipping package and, inverting the package, you literally dump the thousands of bees on top of the frames in the hive. Literally but gently. A couple of rounds of shakes and most of the bees will be out. Those that are left in the shipping cage are of no worry. Just put the shipping package in front of the hive, the top hole aimed at the front of the hive and the bees will exit at their own leisure With the bees in the hive, you put the inner cover atop the spacer, then the top cover. You should supply the hive with food to get them started, the Boardman feeder can be in place before you open the shipping package. This is a holder for an inverted quart jar holding a mixture of sugar and water, half and half. Until the bees have foraged enough on their own to have honey in the hive, these feeders will help them to get established.

In two, maybe three days, check to see if the queen is out of the cage. If the queen is out, remove the empty queen cage. If the queen is still in the cage, carefully work one of the holes open enough so the queen can exit without the candy plug having to be chewed through. Usually the bees learn the smell of the new queen in a day or so and will do the freeing themselves. If the queen is not released, you can help things along. Keep your finger over the hole when you are not working on opening the hole, you do not want the queen to get out and go flying around the neighborhood. The bees will immediately follow her.
