

PACKET TIP

Do you find yourself typing the same commands every time you log in to the DX Packet Spotting Network? For example, every time I log in, I like to enter SH/WWV/2 to see what conditions are like, DIR/BU/6 to see one-line summaries of the last 6 bulletins posted, and finally SH/ DX/6 to see the last 6 DX announcements. Don't you wish there were a way to enter these commands automatically, every time you sign in? Well, there is! Just type UPLOAD/USERCMD (enter), and then enter your favorite commands, one per line. When you are finished, type / EXIT. Thereafter, every time you sign in to the DXPSN, all your favorite commands will be issued automatically. I have found this to be a big time saver. However, during a contest, when you often get disconnected and have to reconnect, it's a good idea to disable this function. This is done just by saying UPLOAD/ USERCMD (enter) /EXIT (enter) to empty the file. You can view the contents of your USERCMD file at any time by entering TYPE/USERCMD.


W60WQ -- SILENT KEY BY K6HIO

He was an avid RTTY and contest fan (especially on 20m), and known to many around the world. In the Belmont, CA area his 100' Sky Needle with its stack of beams (including a 2 element 40m Yagi) were a local landmark for many years.

During the Alaska earthquake, he became the only radio-path to that area (even the military couldn't get thru), and he and several volunteer relief operators handled all traffic in and out of Alaska.

Known by his friends as someone who never said no when asked for help, someone who would give you his shirt if you needed one, he will be sorely missed by those who knew him.



A JUG FEATURE STORY

A little while ago in one of our serious weekly telephone conversations, Jim Maxwell, W6CF, and I discovered that we both had read and clipped the same story for use someday in some desrving publication. We both knew the author, having worked him many times. I had the story earmarked for the JUG, of course. Jim had been requested by another publication to submit something for publication, so he had written an introduction and had the story ready to go. However, that other publication didn't use it. Hence complete with Jim's introduction, we're jumping in and reprintingitherefor JUG readers. Thanks, Jim. (ISQ-Ed.)

DX & ETC de Jim, W6CF

The fascination of DXing lies not only in making long haul radio contacts, but also lies in learning more about the places and folks I've worked throughout the world. Consider, for example, Jo Doering, DLIRK, who lives in Germany, north of Frankfurt. I first worked Jo too many years ago to remember. We say hello to one another in a brief chat occasionally, always on CW. (He's a super CW operator), and we've had two or three eyeball QSLs. Then , a bit more than a year ago an article written by Jo appeared in the Winter 1991 issue of Focus, a CW magazine published in the U.K. I was stunned. My friend had been keeping a fantastic story secret for nearly 50 years. It instantly became my all-time favorite radio tale. And it's TRUE! Here it is, for all of you to enjoy.

A REMARKABLE QSO By Jo Doering, DL1RK

During WW2 I served as a Lance Corporal in a special army signal corps unit in the Afrika Corps. We intercepted the enemy's tactical radio communication in the African war theater and used to be Rommel's ears.

Late afternoon on May 7th 1943, five days before we had to surrender to Tunisia, our company commander asked me if I would like to communicate with the enemy. "Sure I do," was my answer. My first thought was that it was the give up message, the end of the fighting in Africa. But the message to be sent was about a target not to be bombed. Since the allied bombers flew in from the west, the message had to be addressed to the British 1st Army who operated in this area. Therefore I chose a radio net from HQ British First Army, noted frequency and call signs, took the message and went to the transmitter van about half a mile from our receiving site.

The British net was very busy that night, and I had to wait for a long time. Meanwhile I practiced with the straight key since I had not used one for about a year or so sitting in front of a receiver taking down the foe's radio traffic. At last the net I was tuned into had worked up all the traffic they had at hand.

Now is was my turn. With the 80 watt Lorenz transmitter carefully set to zero beat and with the "borrowed" call they had used last, I hit the key: "QTC" and then I made a big mistake by using the British 8th Army's "X279?" instead of the 1st Army's "QRK?" The HQ station came back with a question mark. I started over again, but this time with "QTC1 QRK? K." QRK DADIDADIDAH, "to the 5 was the answer. headquarters allied expeditionary forces in Africa from the HQ of the Axis Forces in Africa." Then the guy I had the call "borrowed" came in: "That's not me, its a propaganda message from the enemy. But I broke in with "It's not propaganda, but life or dead for your own people." In the end the HQ station told me to go ahead with my message.

It read as I recall from my memory: "Two ships are in the harbours of Tunis. One freighter with 600 allied prisoners in the holds and a hospital ship. Do not bomb those two ships to save lives of your own people."

I received "QSL" for my message and said I will QRX tomorrow same time, same frequency for a possible reply. No reply was received during the next days. The event faded in my memory during the years to follow until in 1950 I bought a book about the war in Africa. In it I found the message I had sent and the reaction that took place. General Alexander, Commander of the British 1st Army, met the captured German General von Arnim and thanked him for the message which saved 600 of his soldiers. He agreed to send 600 wounded Germans in a hospital ship to Italy.

In a small way I had helped to add some human touch in this cruel war. Therefore I call this my only worthwhile QSO ever.

NEXT MEETING


